Anti-Histamine Probe As Cause Of Death

East Chicago, Ind., Feb. 6.—(UPI)—Investigators sought to determine today whether Mrs. Ethel Shumat, 31, died of an overdose of anti-histamine cold tablets.

Coroner Joseph McGuinn sent organic specimens from the woman's body to the University of Illinois pharmacology laboratory at Chicago after Coroner's Physician Dr. E. A. Campagna was unable to determine the cause of death.

Mrs. Shumat was found dead Friday in her two-room apartment. She lay under a heap of bed clothing in the bedroom. Her husband, Edward, told authorities that his wife had bought 40 anti-histamine pills to treat a cold three days before her death. He said only four tablets were left when her body was found.

Rogue River High School To Give Three-Act Play

Resentment mounts when the girls move into Johnny's news office, recently transformed from his nursery, and complications arise.

Before the curtain falls on the second act, Susan, although always armed with the best possible intentions, has almost bankrupted the "Penguin," shaken the friendship of the "musketees" and given them the measles. When her innocent enthusiasm for the barter system involves all three in an illegal pinball game, which almost lands them in jail, Mrs. Clover (Nancy Hoover), with her practical domestic philosophy in parental guidance, aids in solving the problems, not only for the young people, but also for Principal Henry Quinn (Charles Jacobs) and the pretty journalism teacher, Miss Martha Willard (Marilyn Williamson), whose lives have been disrupted by the ubiquitous but ever-adorable Susan.

Mrs. Virginia Westerfield will direct the music groups for specialties between acts. Production committees include the stage crew, Darrell Winters, Johnnie Wentling, Eldin Hicks and Harry Frantz; prompters and props, Gladys Bennett and Friedel Hennicke; publicity and programs, Melba Elder, Joy May, Mary Lee Barber, Pat Kasper and Mary Shock. Persecution Complex Results In Murder

Kaunahakai, Molokai, T. H., Feb. 6.—(UPI)—A crazed killer who slew a sick minister, wounded a policeman and killed himself Saturday after terrorizing 22 hospital patients was believed today to have been the victim of a persecution complex.

Detective Captain John Seabury said that plantation worker Thomas Alcantra started on his two-hour pre-dawn rampage in the belief the minister, Rev. Edward Paaluh, has devised a fantastic plot to kill him. Alcantra killed himself as police closed in on him.

When he went on his rampage, 16 terror-stricken patients es-

caped through windows, but others were unable to leave their beds at the Molokai community hospital.

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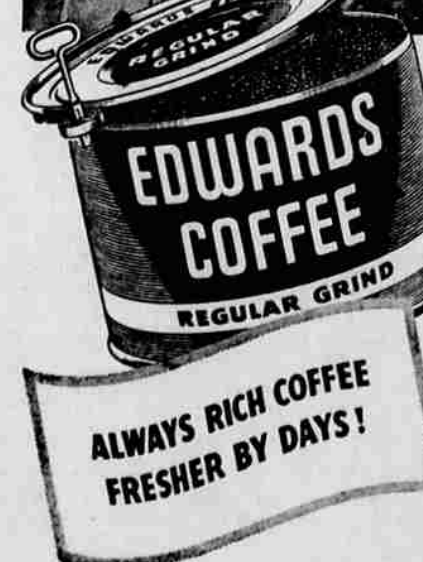


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
