Science Predicts 9 Hours To Moon By Rocket Plane

Lincoln, Neb. (U.P.) — Some day about 50 years from now, a space ship may make the 240,000-mile trip to the moon, and return to the earth within 24 hours.

That is the belief of J. P. Colbert, professor of civil engineering at the University of Nebraska. He is confident science will solve the problem of fueling a giant rocket ship for the expedition by about the year 2000.

According to Colbert's predictions, the ship will take off at an almost perpendicular angle and hurtle through the air at the necessary seven-miles-per-second "escape speed." Once the plane is clear of the air surrounding the earth, he said, its rockets can be cut off and it can coast through space a large part of the time.

He estimated the journey will take about nine hours. The aircraft will have to land stern first, Colbert said, using its rockets to break the impact of the landing.

The arrival on the moon will be timed for the "dawn line," just as that planet's 336-hour "day" is beginning, Colbert said. The temperature there reaches the hotter-than-boiling point of 214 degrees when the sun is directly overhead, he noted, and the two-week-long "nights" get as cold as 215 degrees below zero. Therefore men must plan to arrive at the most temperate time, he explained.

Astronomers believe men can remain safely on the moon one or two hours before beginning the return voyage, Colbert said. The takeoff from the moon will be far easier, he said, since its gravity is only one-sixth as strong as the earth's.

SCHEDULE REVISED — West Coast airlines today announced two revisions in north-bound schedules. The first north-bound flight now leaves here at 9 a.m., giving businessmen an extra hour in Portland on one-day trips, and an afternoon flight to the north leaves at 4:45 p.m. The new schedule has been in effect since February 1.

General theme of the conference was concerned with the reduction of the delivered cost of logs. Robert Grimmer, of Pine Logging company, Fresno, Cal., was named president of the organization. Other officers are Herbert McMahan, of R. L. Smith Lumber company, Anderson, Cal., vice president, and Jack S. Berry, of Michigan-California Lumber company, Corning, Cal., secretary. More than 525 persons attended.

Russell Williams, who has been a weather observer at the Medford weather bureau since August, 1947, has been transferred to the air force weather station in Honolulu, T. H. He left Medford today and will sail from San Francisco to his new post February 8.

Robert Church, official in charge of the bureau here, said a replacement for Williams has not yet arrived but will be announced within a few days.
