

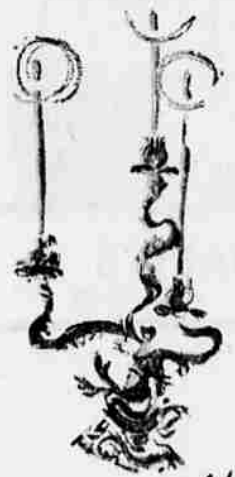

Emergency Board Authorizes Purchase

Salem, Ore., Feb. 8.—(U.P.)—The state emergency board has authorized the purchase for inclusion in the capitol zone of a Summer street lot that had been chosen as the site for a seven-story apartment building.

The emergency board, at a special meeting called here Monday by its chairman, Senate President William E. Walsh of Coos Bay, authorized the state board of control to buy the Summer street lot from Robert T. Coates, Portland builder.

Coates had purchased the property, had obtained a commitment for an FHA loan and had taken out a building permit for the project here when he learned that the property was in the path of the capitol zone.

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To Draft Plans For Conservation Education Here

The Jackson County Soil Conservation District Referendum committee will meet at the courthouse Friday, February 10, at 8 p.m. to draft plans for an educational campaign in the interests of the formation of a soil conservation district in the county.

Landowners who hold more than 10 acres in Jackson county, outside of the area adjacent to the city of Rogue River, will be asked to vote on the issue March 22. If 30 per cent of the eligible landowners approve the proposal, the district will be formed under state law for the purpose of coordinating soil and water conservation.

To Encourage Planning

The district would have no legal right to levy taxes or assessments and would not be compulsory on landowners in the district. The district would encourage planned improvements for better utilization of irrigation, drainage and land use. By formation of the district, technical assistance and engineering service may be furnished by the federal soil conservation service.

The referendum committee, under the chairmanship of Dave Lowry, has issued a statement saying it believes the district here could do much "to improve the productivity of the land and at the same time conserve and even increase the value of land resources in Jackson county."

Sears Roebuck Store Damaged By Flames

Chehalis, Wash., Feb. 8.—(U.P.)—An early morning fire fanned by 35-mile-an-hour winds swept through the lower part of the Sears, Roebuck & Company store here today.

Store Manager Frank Moir said prompt work by firemen saved most of the stock from the greedy flames. The fire, which broke out in the basement of the building, was climbing inside the walls to the second floor when firemen got the blaze

under control after an hour-long battle. The store's contents received heavy smoke and water damage. Moir said the stock was valued at \$200,000.



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
