Both fancy Oregon anjous and No. 1 bosc showed a gain of 40 cents a box from Monday to Monday. The jump put the average price for anjous at slightly more than \$5 and bosc a little over \$6.50.

Interior Decorator Says Choose Colors For Home And Then Stick By Them

New York (U.P.)—Just because you paint the living room walls green every other spring is no sign you're in a home decorating rut.

Ellen Lehman McCluskey, a socialite interior decorator, says it's foolish to follow fashions in home decorating colors.

"A woman should decorate her home in colors she likes and that are becoming to her, and then stick by her colors," Mrs. McCluskey said.

She does some very fancy decorating jobs for socialites and also decorates simple apartments for young married couples. In either case, she isn't so interested in achieving a striking color effect as she is in planning a becoming setting for the family.

Right now Mrs. McCluskey is putting her theories into practice in the Park avenue apartment where she lives with her husband and two children. Ten years ago she decorated her bedroom in ice pink, mauve and purple. The bedroom in the new apartment is being done in exactly the same shades.

"I'm even getting more of the same pink brocade I originally used to cover the twin beds," she said. "I like delicate shades and I think they're becoming to me, so why change?"

The walls of her bedroom and the carpet are of identical shades of pink. The drapes are pink with a pink and purple fringe. A couple of tiny chairs covered in purple are the only touches of contrasting color.

Mrs. McCluskey also ignores the decorating theory that a room should have both plain fabrics and stripes or prints to give it interest. She often does a room all in solid colors, using different textures and different shades of one color to achieve her variety.

One Color Effective

"If you have only a little money to spend you can get more effect with chintz and wallpaper than with plain colors," she admitted. "But if you can afford really good fabrics and furniture, it is very effective to use a simple, one-color plan for a room."

Air Reservists To Be Aided By Air Force Men

Capt. E. McKenzie, recently assigned to the 9417th volunteer air reserve unit here as liaison officer, and Sgt. D. W. Mendenhall, his assistant, attended a meeting of the reserve held last night. The two men were sent here from the fourth air force. Captain McKenzie coming from a previous assignment at Portland and the sergeant coming from fourth air force headquarters at Hamilton field.

At present the two men have offices in the armory and will be available to any reservists, officers or airmen, who wish to participate in the local air reserve program, it was stated. A schedule of meetings has been planned, with volunteer reserves meeting twice each month on the second and third Wednesday nights and the Southern Oregon Air Research association meeting on the fourth Wednesday night.

Training To Start
Meetings are at present being held in the reserve building at the Medford airport, and at next Wednesday's meeting a formal training program will begin, according to Major M. M. Heisel, USAF, director of training. Movies will be shown and a lecture on administration and staff duties will be given by Col. J. C. Langdon, USAF, squadron commander.

At last night's meeting Col. Elmer H. Stambaugh, USAF, Footh Creek, commanding officer of the 9091st group, VART, introduced his staff. The group has headquarters in Medford and covers all of southern Oregon and much of central Oregon.

The officer introduced Col. James Clark, Grants Pass; Lt. Col. George Eldon, Grants Pass; Lt. Col. Bruce Moffatt, Medford; Capt. Maxwell P. Guiley, Capt. James Row, First Lt. William Salade and First Lt. Robert McIntyre, all of Medford, and all air reserve officers.

Both Capt. McKenzie and Sgt. Mendenhall will establish homes in the valley.
