AHI AHI BETTER NOT CAUTERIZE THAT WOUND

In my files somewhere is a clipping of a communication to the editor of a newspaper from the health commissioner of a metropolitan community, in the course of which the health officer stated: "The only known way to destroy the rabies virus is by cauterizing the wound with fuming nitric acid. Fuming nitric acid is the strongest acid. How the health commissioner acquired the knowledge which warranted his arbitrary assertion he did not explain. No one has isolated or identified rabies virus. The assumption that rabies in animals is caused by a virus is only a theory advanced by scientific investigators who have failed to find any specific germ or other demonstrable cause of rabies."

Cauterizing a wound with nitric acid or anything else—say an electro-cautery or a red hot iron or pure phenol ("carbolic acid") or any caustic or corrosive—is a dramatic procedure, and perhaps that is why the health commissioner favored it. One health commissioner told me, when I commented here upon the mad dog scares health officers stir up in the newspapers, that the health department has to dramatize such things in order to get appropriations from the local government.

But few if any physicians or surgeons of recent vintage will agree that cauterization of a wound gives the patient as much protection against infection as does proper surgical disinfection of the wound.

Cauterizing may have been good enough treatment in the nineteenth century. Surgical cleansing and disinfection of any fresh wound is the only first aid treatment we can recognize as adequate in the twentieth century.

A well established principle of emergency surgical treatment or first aid is that every bit of foreign matter or dead tissue must be removed from the wound immediately. If any minute shred of dead tissue or any bit of foreign matter remains embedded or lodged in the wound it becomes a serious hazard, for it favors lodgment and multiplication of tetanus germs or other disease-producing bacteria that may be present.

Cauterizing destroys more or less tissue, and the dead tissue makes a good culture medium for disease germs.

It seems astonishing that even a health commissioner can have the temerity to commit himself in such arbitrary fashion at this late day. But when we recall how many mad dog scares the same "authority" has whipped up in the newspapers in recent years it is not so hard to understand.

About the time the health commissioner asserted so positively that only fuming nitric acid will destroy rabies virus, he invited me to visit the health department laboratory where he would convince me of the reality of rabies. I assumed he meant rabies in man, and called on the commissioner at once.

He took me over to the lab, introduced me to the man in charge there, and showed me a rabbit in a cage. The rabbit, the commissioner said, would die within 14 days just how many days—of rabies. The rabbit had been inoculated with "hydrophobia" (superstitious synonym for rabies preferred by healers' authorities) for its dramatic effect and would die of the disease.

Of course I did not doubt the commissioner's word. But I failed to see what bearing it had on the question of rabies in man. Somewhat impatiently, though still with courtesy, the commissioner terminated the interview, and I came home sadder but no wiser.

I leave to the veterinarians the question of rabies in animals. Rabies in man, to the best of my knowledge, has never been scientifically proved.

QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

Ruptured Disk

Can you advise me as to how to prevent recurrence of ruptured disk (of spine). (J. M.)

Answer—Surgical removal of the bulging portion, or complete removal of the disk with or without "fusion" of the joint offers best possibility of permanent relief.

Torn Pelvic Floor

Pelvic floor torn in childbirth. What does that mean and what can be done about it? (Mrs. R. S. T.)

Answer—Pelvic floor consists in part of muscles, which support pelvic organs. These are sometimes torn apart in childbirth, and unless repaired, permit sagging and partial protrusion of pelvic organs. Surgical operation cures the condition. No other treatment is curative.

Epsom Salts

Do epsom salts cause 1) reducing, 2) injury to kidneys? (K.W.T.)

Answer—1. No. 2. No. Makes little difference whether you bathe in epsom salts or apple sauce. Harmless pastime, but useless.
