

Calls Thumb Sucking Menace To Children

Evanston, Ill. (U.P.)—Thumb sucking by children can cause permanent damage to teeth and jaws, a dental expert says.

Dr. George W. Teuscher, professor of children's dentistry at Northwestern university, bases his opinion on a study of 989 children at the school.

It was found that only three of 173 youngsters who sucked thumbs or fingers showed no ill effects.

The occlusion of teeth and jaws may be effected by thumb sucking, he said, although there is still no definite finding to prove it.

It was found that in many instances children sucked their thumbs only when falling asleep. The cause, he said, may be due to fear of being alone in the darkness.

"Sometimes the habit can be cured by the simple expedient of leaving a dim light in the child's room at night," Teuscher said.

Scientist Wondering What Hitler Thought

Santa Barbara, Calif. (U.P.)—What were the forces that dominated Hitler and how did they work?

The answer to those questions is being sought by Douwe Stuurman, an assistant professor at Santa Barbara college, University of California.

Stuurman, member of a wartime military intelligence unit, became interested in the problem when his unit found many Nazi records buried in an Austrian salt mine.

He expects to carry on most of his research at the Library of Congress in Washington and may go to Germany.

His research will include the manuscripts of the Bavarian poet Dietrich Eckart, who he believes had the most profound influence in shaping Hitler's mind.

Blind Vet Leads All When Lights 'Go Out' At College In Texas

Commerce, Tex. (U.P.)—Dick Yocum of Pekin, Ill., is a blind veteran enrolled at East Texas State college. His sense of humor makes up for what he lacks in vision.

Blinded by an accident during World War II, the former member of the army air corps is a senior sociology student. One of his favorite tales is about the night when the lights went out in the men's dormitory and he led all the students to their rooms—for a slight fee.

Only Little Wrong With Offender Car

Dublin (U.P.)—A man who was fined four guineas (\$12) because his car was held together mainly by cord and Providence, protested that it had only a "few things" wrong with it.

The judge still thought the fine was reasonable when he read aloud a description of the car, which said:

"The bonnet was tied with cord; there was neither hand-brake nor foot-brake; the steering wheel turned almost fully around before it acted on the wheels; the rear mudguard was held in place by a rope; the off-side driving door was a fixture with no handle, and entry had to be made through the nearside door; the right window was fixed so that a hand signal could not be given; the horn would not blow, and the front mud guards were loose."

"Did you say a 'few things' or did I imagine it?" There was no answer.

Even Heating In Home Advised For Comfort

Lincoln, Neb. (U.P.)—When a home heating system fails to distribute heat evenly, the chances are the trouble can be traced to the location of the thermostat.

E. A. Olson, of the University of Nebraska, said that uncomfortable, chilly feeling around the house often indicates uneven, rather than too little, heat.

Place the thermostat on an inside wall, where an even temperature can be maintained, he advised. Other rooms will not be comfortable if the regulator itself is warmed by sunlight, a fireplace fire, or warm air from a register or radiator, or cooled by drafts from stairways or doors.

If there are small children in the house, the thermostat should be placed about two feet above the floor to insure a comfortable temperature for them, Olson said.

College Offers Course In Atomic Age Problem

Kent, O. (U.P.)—The 1950 winter quarter program at Kent State university offers "Problems of an Atomic Age," believed to be the first credit course of its kind of American colleges.

The course is designed to acquaint students with the meaning of atomic energy in the light of the natural sciences. Also up for discussion by campus and visiting lecturers will be the application of atomic energy for constructive or destructive purposes through the social sciences, and the problem of world peace.

Scientist Says Skull Links Ape And Man

Brisbane, Australia. (U.P.)—Prof. R. A. Dart claims to have discovered a prehistoric skull which links the human race with that of the apes.

Dart, who is dean of the faculty of medicine and dentistry at the University of Queensland, Johannesburg, South Africa, returned to Brisbane for the first time since he left, in 1918, as a captain in the Australian army medical corps.

Dart claimed that he also was the discoverer, in 1924, of the famous Taung and Makapansgat fossil man-like ape remains.

He said his prehistoric skull is that of an infant taung and that it is 1,000,000 years old, filling up the gap between the most advanced apes and very primitive man.

Revolving 'Sun' Home Proposed In Florida

Miami, Fla. (U.P.)—A "sun-flower" house which would revolve on a platform to follow the path of the sun has been suggested by Sylvan Bien, architect.

Bien said the revolving house would be ideal for Florida. The New York architect is developing ideas for Florida living which include not only the platform home but a spiral-shaped one as well. Both ideas would take maximum advantage of breezes and sunlight.

Indianapolis (U.P.)—Indiana grain dealers holding a convention here got an unexpected dividend at a luncheon given at the Columbia Club. The club's cooks got word of 30 cancelled reservations after apple pies were baked. It was decided to cut the pies into six pieces each, instead of the customary seven.

Baltimore. (U.P.)—The days of the illiterate sailor who signed his shipping articles with an "X" and curled his lip at the sight of a book are over, according to the American Merchant Marine Library association here.

John V. Landon, port agent for the association, said more seamen than ever before are taking an interest in literature and in the facilities his organization has to offer.

Landon said he equipped nearly 300 American merchant ships with libraries during 1949 when they entered the port of Baltimore.

Old Country "FLOAT DOH" HUNGARIAN WATER ROLLS

HUNGARIAN WATER ROLLS (KIPFEL) Adapted by Mary Mills

Besides 4 1/2 cups FISHER'S BLEND FLOUR, sifted and measured—you'll need:

- 1 cup rich top milk
- 1 1/2 cups yeast
- 2 T. sugar
- 1/2 cup cool water
- 1 1/2 T. salt
- 1/2 cup sweet butter
- 1 cup egg yolks
- 2 T. vanilla
- 1/2 T. lemon extract
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 2 T. cinnamon

Here is Mary Mills' modern version of a treasured recipe. Mix sugar, yeast and water. Let stand until light and fluffy. Rub butter, flour and salt together until crumbly. Beat eggs well. Add milk, scalded and cooled, extracts and yeast mixture. Stir this into flour mixture until smooth. It will be a VERY SOFT DOUGH. Do not knead.

Dip clean flour sack in water. Wring dry. Lay it flat on table. Dust with flour. Put dough in center; bring corners of sack up and tie loosely. Leave room for dough to expand.

Fill a container with about 3 quarts of lukewarm water. Drop dough in carefully. Set aside to rise. It will float when ready. Lift dough out of water. Turn it into bowl. In another bowl, have 1/4 cup sugar and 2 T. cinnamon well mixed. Take dough about size of an egg and press it flat in sugar mixture. Twist dough once or twice to make a roll, weiner size. Shape into horseshoe and lay carefully in well-buttered pan about 1 inch apart. This will make 25 rolls. Sprinkle remaining sugar over tops. Set aside in warm place to rise, about 1 hour, or until double in size. Bake at 350° for 30 minutes or until nicely browned.
