

General Eisenhower Named Best Dressed In America

New York, Feb. 9—(U.P.)—Secretary of State Dean Acheson lost the title of the best dressed man in public life today to Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, president of Columbia university, because he "sometimes overdresses."

Selection of Eisenhower as one of the nation's 10 best dressed men was announced by Custom Tailors' Guild of America, Inc.

"Gen. Eisenhower shows perfect judgment in wearing clothes which reflect the dignity of his office . . . and his role of elder statesman," the guild announced.

He emerged considerably ahead of last year's favorite, Dean Acheson, who several guild members noted "sometimes overdresses."

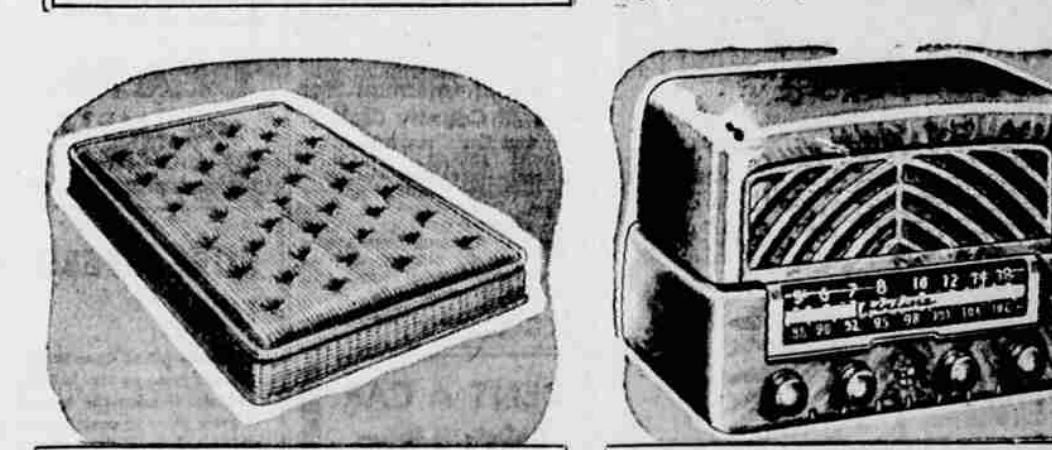

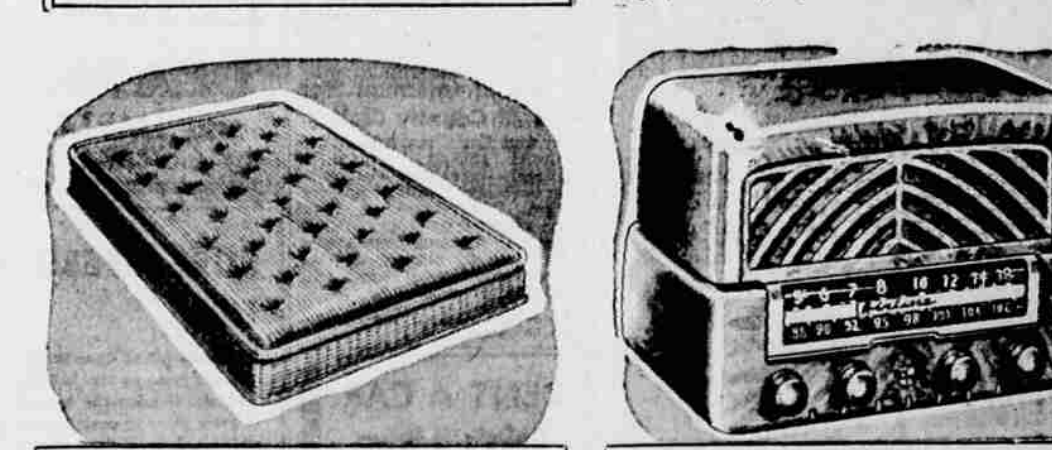

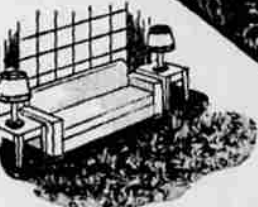
