Bergman Film Not To Be Shown In Medford

The Italian film "Stromboli," directed by Roberto Rossellini and starring Ingrid Bergman, has not been booked to show in Medford, members of the Medford Ministerial association were informed yesterday by Matt Freed, manager of the Robert L. Lippert theaters in southern Oregon and northern California. The association requested Freed to meet with them in regard to the showing of the film, which has been banned in various other cities across the nation. The theater man said that his bookings have been completed up to April 1, and that the disputed film has not been scheduled.

Objections in other cities have not been motivated by the film itself, but by what has been called "brazen defiance of public decency and marital fidelity" on the part of Miss Bergman.
