THE OTHER day the republican can big shots came up with a new slogan for the 1950 congressional campaign. This is it: "Liberty versus Socialism." It appealed to me as milder than dishwater, and apparently it didn't scare the fair deal boys much.

Anyway, "Veep" Barkley came back at the GOP leaders with a demand that they tell the voters specifically what democratic-sponsored laws they want repealed. He added:

"Let them be honest and say whether they are for or against these laws. We're not afraid of their shibboleths or their promulgations."

"Legislation for extending social security coverage and increasing benefits is now before the senate. I would like to ask the republican platform-makers to say whether they call that socialistic and whether they are for it or against it."

EVERY TIME the republican poohbas get to muttering in their beards about the socialistic sins of the democrats, the democrats ask them that \$64 question as to just what they would repeal if given the chance. "First, we're going to BALANCE THE GOVERNMENT'S BOOKS. We're going to spend no more (including annual payments on the principal of our debt) than we can raise by taxation. We think that keeping our nation solvent is the big issue."

"As for social benefits, they are fine. In these days of growing technological progress, with the machine and modern assembly line methods providing production of things in volume exceeding any dream of the past, it is possible to provide the people with social benefits that couldn't be even imagined a generation or so ago. We're all for such progress toward better living standards and fewer gnawing worries about old age."
