Battleship Missouri Glides Past Mudbank

Norfolk, Va., Feb. 10—(U.P.)—The battleship Missouri glided back into Hampton Roads today, past the mudbank on which she spent 15 unhappy days, and reported that her overnight sea trial was a complete success.

A message from the Big Mo to Rear Adm. Allan E. Smith, commander of cruisers of the Atlantic fleet, said: "Everything normal." Officers said the battleship will take on stores, fuel oil and ammunition and will sail early next week for Cuba to take part in joint maneuvers.

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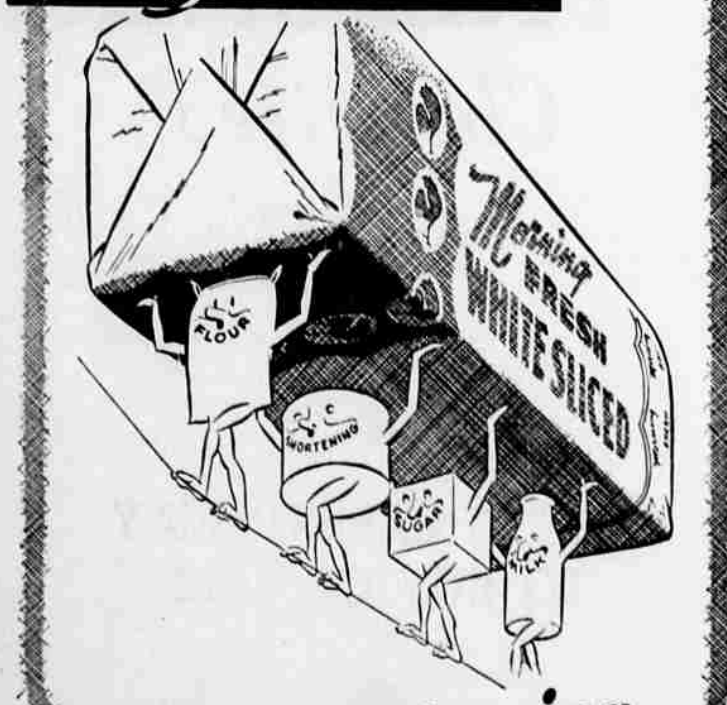
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
