**Pillsbury To Close
Mill At Astoria**

Astoria, Ore., Feb. 10—(U.P.)—The division president of Pillsbury Mills, Inc., B. J. Greer of Los Angeles, said here today one of its two Astoria mills would be closed because of the loss of export markets for flour and a drop in domestic business due to high wheat support prices.

Flour shipments took a considerable drop, he said, when the north China markets dissolved with the advance of communist troops. In other Oriental markets, Australia and Canadian flour undersells U. S. flour.

Pillsbury's northwest manager, Carl Schencker, said South and Central America might be good prospects for new markets for northwest flour.

**Heavy Fog Delays
Portland Flights**

Portland, Ore., Feb. 10—(U.P.)—Fog delayed several scheduled air lines flights here during the night, and the Civil Aeronautics administration at the Portland-Columbia airport said the belt of fog extended from Salem, Ore., to Olympia, Wash.

Thickest portion of the fog centers in the Portland area where visibility was cut to less than 1,000 feet for several hours.

**Idaho White Pine
Production Declines**

Portland, Ore., Feb. 10—(U.P.)—Orders, shipments, and production dropped for the week ending February 3 on Idaho white pine, ponderosa pine, sugar pine and associated species, the Western Pine association said today after surveying information from 103 identical mills.

Orders totaled 64,605,000 feet, compared with 74,050,000 feet for the previous week, and 46,764,000 feet for the corresponding week last year.

Similar comparisons of shipments were 60,659,000 feet, 63,454,000 feet, and 50,936,000 feet. Production figures were 40,922,000 feet, 45,711,000 feet and 41,277,000 feet.

For the year to date, orders are 16 per cent more than for the same period of 1949, shipments 8 per cent more, and production down 4 per cent.

Weekly averages for February during the three preceding years were 58,187,000 feet for orders, 60,520,000 feet for shipments, and 48,319,000 feet for production.

**County Court Bans
Cleared Vehicles**

The Jackson county court has ordered that all types of "cleared vehicles" shall be prohibited from all paved or oiled county roads. Effective this week, the order was made to protect surfaced roads from damage and injury beyond the normal wear and tear.

The restriction is to remain in effect until "modified," annulled or voided by the order of the court.

County Engineer Paul Rynning said today that thawing conditions have proved damaging to several county roads, particularly in the Wimer area, and that the reduced load limits imposed in January and early this month were put in effect just in time to save roads from serious damage. The limits will be removed just as soon as roadbeds are firm enough to hold heavy truck traffic without going to pieces, he said.

**Last Of Motor Coaches
Due In Portland Soon**

Portland, Ore., Feb. 10—(U.P.)—The Portland Traction company said today the remainder of the 32 new motor coaches to replace streetcars now serving on two Portland lines will arrive here within a few more days.

After the streetcars are removed from service, downtown Portland streets will be changed over to a one-way grid system to speed up traffic.

**Douks Released On
Bail Pending Hearing**

Nelson, B. C., Feb. 10—(U.P.)—Three Sons of Freedom Doukhobors were out on combined bail of \$60,000 here today, pending hearing of charges against them.

Four others remained in jail, including two top radical leaders. Out on bail were John Lebedoff, self-styled leader of 5,000 Freedomites in the Krestova district, and William J. Perepelkin and Peter Malakoff, both of Krestova. Lebedoff was on \$50,000 bail and the other two on \$5,000 bail each.

Lebedoff, Michael "The Archangel" Verigin and Joe Podovinnikoff were arrested about two weeks ago on 10 charges covering the last five years of Doukhobor unrest. Bail of \$50,000 was set for each, but only Lebedoff was able to raise the money.

**January Snowstorm
Cost Portland \$14,399**

Portland, Ore., Feb. 10—(U.P.)—City of Portland traffic officials noted today that January's snowstorms here cost the city \$14,399 in lost parking meter revenue when compared with the December income.

Seattle officials earlier had estimated their January meter loss at approximately \$7,000.

City Engineer L. G. Apperson said street sanding and snow disposal in Portland this season has cost \$125,000 so far, \$105,000 more than was appropriated several months ago. The balance of the cost was made up from the emergency fund, he said.

Apperson said Portland street damage by ice and snow will run

into the "tens of thousands of dollars."
