Children Of Coal Miners Missing School Because Of Food Shortage

Birmingham, Ala., Feb. 10.—(U.P.)—A third grade student at Mulga school, in the heart of the coal mining district here, told his teacher he was too ashamed to bring a lunch.

"My mother had only a biscuit to wrap for me," he said. W. D. Nichols, principal of the school, said this was a typical example of how hungry children have been in many coal mining communities in the Birmingham area.

Not Sick

"We have a child who was absent the other day," Nichols said. "I happened to see his father, a coal miner, and asked if his son was sick."

"No," Nichols said the father any food to put in the boy's lunch. The only thing we have to eat is gruel (cornmeal prepared in a liquid in a pot) and he couldn't take that to school."

Mulga school has 400 pupils. One-half of them are children of coal miners. Their fathers worked for Woodward Iron company and the Tennessee Coal, Iron and Steel company.

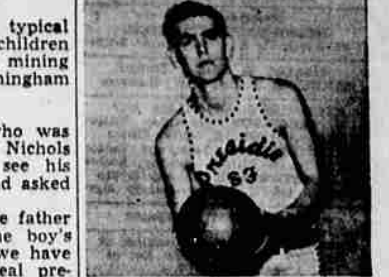
Worked Two Days

The coal miners at TCI have worked only two days this year and those at Woodward only a few days more.

"I've been teaching the sons of coal miners for 35 years," Nichols said. "I've never seen it this bad."

"We'll be all right once we get a union contract," one miner said. "Until then we'll have to live hand-to-mouth. We appreciate what the teachers are doing for our children. That's what worries us most—the kids—be-
