Rotarians Slate Forum Tuesday On Club Activities

Representative of Rotary clubs of southern Oregon and northern California will join with the Medford club in an inter-city forum here Tuesday, with John B. Reilly, past international director, as principal speaker. Sessions will be held at the Esquire theatre starting at 2:30 p.m. and continue into the evening. A dinner meeting is scheduled at 6:15 p.m. in the Pioneer room of the Jackson hotel.

John Reilly, whose home is in Whittier, Cal., is founder and owner of the Fluid Packed Pump company, manufacturers of oil well pumps at Los Nietos. Before becoming a director of Rotary international he was president of the Whittier Rotary club and a district governor.

Among the subjects slated for discussion in the Medford meeting will be various phases of Rotary activity including club service, vocational service, community activities, the organization's international program and Rotary foundation fellowships.

Charles Cooley, present district governor of Rotary in this area, will be among the speakers. James Dunlevy, president of the Medford club, will extend the official welcome of the host club.

Night Boating Starts Again Columbia River

Portland, Ore., Feb. 11—(U.P.)—Night navigation on the lower Columbia river has been resumed after six weeks' suspension, the coast guard said today.

Buoys and navigation lights, which were damaged by ice, have been replaced or temporary markers installed.

CVA Defended In Talk To Lions By Portland Senator

Declaring that the Columbia valley administration, if adopted, would not set up a "super state," and charges that it would establish a "dictatorship," are pure political propaganda statements, Austin Flegel, state senator from Multnomah county, defended the administration's CVA bill before the Medford Lions club Wednesday evening.

Flegel told the Lions club that the bill would distribute authority to more people and that it would bring the administration and development of the natural resources of northwest closer to home than is now the case.

Two Have Power

"All the power that the three-man board would have," Sen. Flegel said, "is now vested in two men, the secretary of defense and the secretary of the interior. The CVA bill provides that two of the three men on the board must be from the northwest. At the present time, the two men who have dictatorial powers over development of the Columbia basin are both from other parts of the country, and, believe me," he added, "their powers are absolute."

Sen. Flegel said development of power is the greatest need now in the northwest, and the CVA would bring about more power development, more reclamation development, with greatest good to the greatest number, than any other proposed program.

Reports Necessary

Under the CVA plan, he pointed out, the board would have to make a complete report each year of what had been done, and present a complete budget of what is proposed for the coming year. The super-state charges, Flegel said, were pure fantasy, because the congress would pass on activities of the CVA each year, and no major development could be undertaken without approval of the congress.

Different taxing units throughout the area would not be deprived of tax base, Flegel said, because the bill provides that the CVA would have to pay amounts in lieu of taxes, to all taxing units when a private utility or other property was purchased by the CVA system. The hundreds of new industries which would follow development of more power, he said, would create additional taxable wealth.

Sen. Flegel said he spoke as a businessman, since he is the president of Willamette Iron and Steel company and a director of many other business firms, including Hyster corporation.

Fidler Elected To Head Realty Board This Year

C. Lyall Fidler was elected president of the Medford Realty board at the group's annual meeting Friday afternoon. He succeeds Don Herried in the position. William Peek was named vice-president, and H. O. Martin will succeed Mary Maass in the secretary-treasurer's job.

Directors named at the meeting include Herried, Carl Tenswald, a member of the state board; Claude McIntyre and Walter Jones.

Ray Schumacher, president of the State Association of Realty Boards, was named by Fidler as general chairman of the state convention committee, which will prepare for the convocation to be held here next September.

A membership drive was inaugurated at the meeting, and Fidler said he hoped the board would double its membership within a year. The drive will be conducted as a contest, with William Kern and Harold Plymmer heading the two teams. The losers will provide a dinner for the winners, Fidler said.

Dairy Production Increase At High Figure Locally

Reports released last week at the annual meeting of the Jackson County Dairy Herd Improvement association show an increase in dairy production here for last year that is greater than the increase reported in the state as a whole for the past 25 years. The local increase was approximately eight per cent in 1949 over 1948.

The increase in production for the year averaged 608 pounds of milk per Jackson county cow and 30.1 pounds of butterfat per cow, according to County Agent Earle Jossy who released the report. The figures represent increases in nine local dairy herds tested by the association during 1948 and 1949.

Directors Named

The dairymen also elected five new directors for one and two-year terms. Serving for two years will be P. K. Nelson, Central Point; D. W. Mongold, Eagle Point; and Ike Dunford, Medford. Elected to one-year terms were R. E. Van Dusen, Gold Hill and Paul Stevenson, Phoenix.

Speakers at the meeting were Dr. G. A. Richardson, agricultural chemist at Oregon State college, and Professor D. C. Mumford, also on the faculty at OSC. Mumford reported on his cost of production survey conducted with 61 herds in the Willamette valley, saying that it costs Oregon dairymen an average of one cent per quart more to produce milk than they receive for it on the market.

Dr. Richardson has been conducting an extensive study into the nutritive values of milk and reported that Oregon milk is superior in quality to that produced on most of the nation's dairies.

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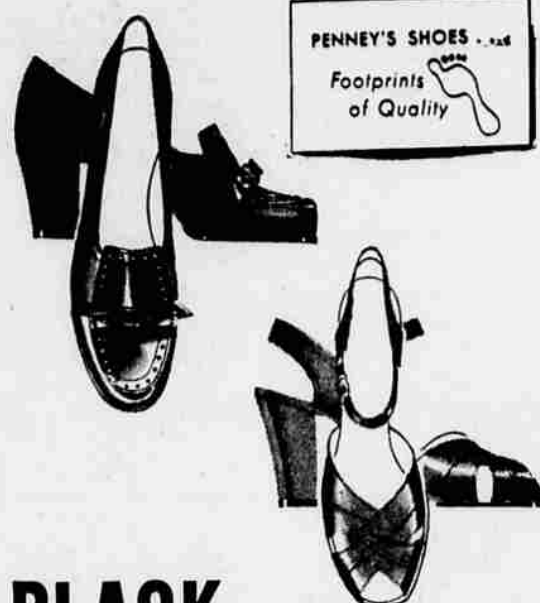
