Junior High Teams Win And Lose at Roseburg

Medford junior high's seventh, eighth and ninth (varsity) basketball teams today looked forward to getting back into the triple-header sweeping process by meeting Grants Pass tonight at Grants Pass Tuesday after winning one and losing two at Roseburg.

Last Friday night on the Indians' junior high floor the local varsity kept its undefeated record intact for two years by taking the measure of Roseburg 26 to 12 but the same evening the Medford seventh graders lost 23 to 13 and the eighth graders lost 34 to 32.

Medford led almost from the start in the varsity contest with the tally reading 5 to 4 at the first quarter, 11 to 7 at the half, 19 to 9 at the third period and 26 to 10 at the fourth.

The eighth grade game was a close match between two equally good squads in which Roseburg led 14 to 9 at the first quarter, 20 to 18 at the half and 31 to 27 at the third period.

In the seventh grade contest the Roseburg team was ahead 7 to 6 at the first quarter, 12 to 10 at the half, also 12 to 10 at the third quarter and 22 to 12 at the fourth quarter.

Defeats for the Medford seventh and eighth graders were the first they had suffered in several games this season and were two of the very few they had suffered all season.

First game at the Eagles gym Thursday, February 16, at 2 p.m. will send Phoenix against St. Mary's and at 4 p.m. the same day that evening at 7 o'clock, Butte Falls will take on Jacksonville and Rogue River, defending district and county champion, will play Gold Hill at 8:30.

Winners of these games will play Friday evening and on the afternoon of that day losing quintets will open the consolation round. Victors in Friday night's contests will play at 9 p.m. on Saturday for the county title and right to go to the state tourney.

Quintets losing the first consolation round will play each other for the consolation prize at 6 p.m. Saturday. Losers of Friday night games will play for third and fourth place at 7:30 p.m. on Saturday.

Tournament winner will represent Jackson county in the district playoff and will be awarded a championship trophy. The second place team will also receive a trophy donated by Lampport's and Sam's Sporting Goods will present a trophy to the third place team.

Haas posted a 66 today for a 54-hole total of 199, 14 under par for three days and good for a two stroke lead facing tomorrow's final 18.

Close behind were Jim Demaret of Ojai, Cal., at 201 and Sam Snead, who came up from deep in the pack to equal Brackenridge park's competitive record with a 63 in today's round.

Snead was in third place, at 202, one stroke up on the national open champion, Dr. Cary Middlecoff. The Memphis dentist was only one over the course record with a 64 in the latest firing.

Ponder Wins San Antonio

Arcadia, Cal., Feb. 11—(U.P.)—Ponder, the great distance-running horse of the Calumet farm, beat his famed stablemate, Citation, by a length today in the \$50,000 added San Antonio handicap at Santa Anita.

Jockey Steve Brooks had to give Calumet farm's Kentucky derby winner everything he had, as he saw Charles S. Howard's Noor coming like the wind and closing on his stablemate.

Citation had run down the pace-setting Bolero in the stretch and appeared on the verge of his first combatch stakes victory, but the Irish-bred Noor and Ponder came flashing up, Jockey Eddie Arcaro gave Citation the whip and manager to cling to a half-length margin over the third horse.

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Portland U. Quits Grid Sports; Lack Of Funds

Portland, Ore., Feb. 11—(U.P.) Intercollegiate football was banned at Portland university today because of "lack of sufficient funds," Rev. T. J. Mehling, president of the Catholic school, said.

"This decision was reached after a long and exhaustive study of the football situation at the university and in this locality."

"It is sufficient to say that the extraordinary expenses involved in the development and expansion program of the university have left us lacking sufficient funds to finance first-class football, without curtailing other programs," he said.

Ban Not Permanent

However, Rev. Mehling added that the ban was not permanent and said "a change in the football picture in the future will allow us to resume the game."

The university will continue its intercollegiate programs in basketball, baseball, track, skiing, tennis, golf and swimming.

"Basketball will be the No. 1 sport," he said.

Portland last season won three and lost eight games and in its 191-game football history, won 83, lost 83 and tied 15.

Schedule Recalled

The announcement said the contracts of Pilot Coach Harry Wright and his staff would be "honored," as would be athletic.

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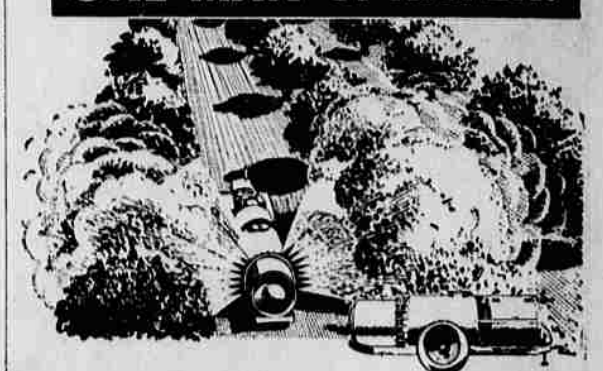
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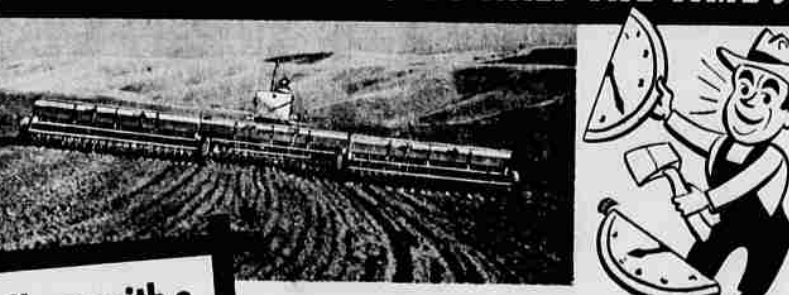
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
