Kiwanis Club Aids Underprivileged In Medical Expenses

Medford Kiwanis club in January provided \$578 for medical and dental expenses for underprivileged children, including \$100 for a cancer operation for a 16-year-old girl. Twelve youngsters were enabled to have tonsillectomies, four to get glasses and two to have dental work done.

That is a sample of the use the club will make of proceeds from the Kiwanis Kapers and Minstrel show of 1950 being produced jointly with Ashland Kiwanians for presentation this month.

Further example of the Medford club's boys' and girls' work is shown in the organization's achievement report for 1949. The club gave \$100 to the polio emergency fund, provided wardrobes for needy children of a destitute family and sent a helpless invalid to Eugene for physical examination and possible rehabilitation. Seventeen children got tonsil or adenoid operations or glasses.

Eight camperships each were provided for the Boy Scouts. Girl scouts and YMCA camp and 10 for the Salvation Army camp. Kiwanians staged their annual Easter egg hunt, gave a Christmas party for handicapped school children and sponsored a movie for youngsters on National Kidney day.

The 1950 Kapers will be the major fund raising activity of the year for the boys and girls program of Medford Kiwanians. William Croarkin, Geller productions man directing the show, has reported good progress with local talent. The show will play at Ashland junior high on February 22 and 23 and at Medford senior high on February 24 and 25.

Croarkin said that the first act will be variety, the second old fashioned minstrel and the third minstrel moderne with a large chorus of girls participating.

General admission and reserved seat tickets are on sale at the Medford hotel and McLain's Drug centre. Kiwanis club members are also selling general admission tickets.

M/Sgt. Richard Denman Arrives At Augsburg, Germany, For Duties

M/Sgt. Richard E. Denman, native of Medford, recently arrived at Augsburg military post, Germany where he was assigned to the 7815th station complement unit, according to army headquarters at Augsburg. Denman, graduate of Medford high school in 1929, has served in the regular army since January 1933. In 1942 he was assigned to General Douglas MacArthur's headquarters and remained in the southwest Pacific area until termination of the war.

He was commissioned a second lieutenant in 1943 and later took over duties as a civilian personnel director with the transportation corps. Denman was accompanied to Augsburg by his wife. He was formerly at the presidio at San Francisco. In Augsburg he will be a planner and assistant to the deputy commander.

College Professor Lectures Tuesday Local High School

Telling of conditions in Czechoslovakia and Poland as he saw them last summer while traveling in those countries, Dr. Frank Munk will lecture in Medford senior high auditorium Tuesday, February 14, at 8 p.m.

Dr. Munk, whose appearance here is sponsored by the Medford League of Women voters, is professor of political science at Reed college in Portland.

Dr. Munk's topic will be "What I Saw in the Russian Orbit."

Czechoslovakia Native — The lecturer, a native of Prague, Czechoslovakia, was active in research in that country before coming to Reed college in 1939.

From 1941 to 1944 he was a lecturer in economics at the University of California and from 1944 until his return to Reed in 1946 he was director of training and then chief economic adviser to the United Nations relief and rehabilitation administration, serving both in Washington, D. C., and in Europe.

He has devoted his professional years to the field of international relations and is considered an outstanding authority. Dr. Munk makes frequent platform appearances and has attracted large audiences both here and in other cities.

The lecture is open to the public without charge and anyone interested is invited to attend.

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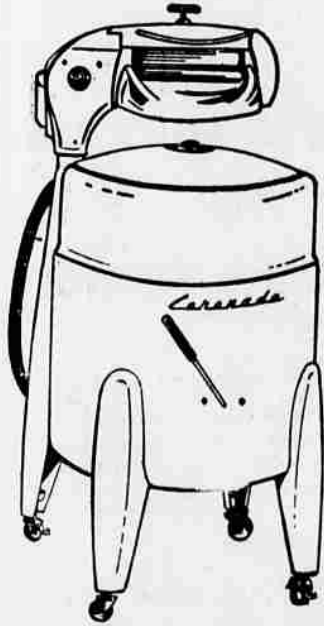
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
