

Attorneys Work On Briefs In Medical Anti-Trust Action

Portland, Ore., Feb. 13—(U.P.)—A full entered the federal anti-trust suit against the Oregon Medical society, affiliated physicians and county medical groups today as government attorneys worked on a brief due in 60 days.

The last government and defense witnesses were heard Saturday and Judge Claude McCollach posted time limits for the filing of briefs.

Defense attorneys will have 60 days to prepare an answer to the government's brief, and the government will be granted 15 days for a reply.

Arguments will begin after the last brief is submitted. The government charges Oregon medical groups tried to exclude commercial hospital associations and set up their own organizations to monopolize pre-paid medical care in the state.

Ill health forced him to abandon this work in January, 1944, at which time he moved to Shady Cove, where he became associated with J. C. Collins of Brown and White agency, opening a branch office of that company in Shady Cove.

He was a leader in Boy scout Troop 46, Shady Cove, and acted as troop committee chairman as long as his health permitted. In addition to his wife, Ruth, he is survived by three children, Mrs. J. C. Crupper, Grangerville, Ida; Harry G. Sanford Jr. and Beverly Anne Sanford, both of Shady Cove; a granddaughter, Sue Anne Crupper, a brother, W. Elgin Sanford, Manchester, N.H.; and a sister, Mrs. A. A. Pope, West Bridgewater, Mass.

Two Republicans Show Interest In Senatorial Race

Portland, Feb. 13—Two prominent republicans from the Portland area were reported considering entering the race for the nomination for United States senator today. Walter W. R. May, publisher of the Oregon City Enterprise, and George L. Koehn, Portland manufacturer, manufacturer, both say that they will decide probably this week. Already in the field are incumbent Senator Wayne Morse, and Fred Robinson, Medford clothier. Robinson has stated that he may withdraw from the contest if a better-known man appears to oppose Morse in the primary election May 19.

Robinson, who is traveling throughout the state in the interests of his candidacy, said that he has no comment for the press at this time.

Portland political observers say that Koehn is considered to be the one who will file. May, who is a former writer for the Portland Oregonian and who later was a Portland Chamber of Commerce executive, said that the future of his newspaper is a major consideration in making his decision.

Koehn, 61, is a manufacturer of carbon paper and typewriter ribbons. He is a past commander of the state department of the American Legion, a lawyer, a former college instructor and a horticulturist.

The station will be on the air as soon as the necessary equipment is constructed and will be equipped so that it can be set up under emergency conditions.

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New Bellview Mill Nears Reopening

Ashland, Feb. 13—John C. Cotton, manager of Lumber Mills corporation, said this week-end that the new mill being constructed at Bellview by the company will be in operation probably within a week or two.

The mill, which will replace the structure destroyed by fire last April, will be one of the most modern mills in the north-west, Cotton said. It is one of the few of its type, and will operate largely with electric power and compressed air. No steam power will be used. Completion of the mill is awaiting arrival of electrical equipment from the east.

Capacity Up Cotton said the mill will be able to handle 60,000 feet of lumber in one eight-hour shift, compared to about 45,000 board feet at the old mill. Band saws will be used in place of circular saws in most operations.

The design of the plant has been handled largely by the staff of the company. A number of labor saving devices will be incorporated in the mill. It was feared for a time after the fire that the company would be unable to reopen the concern.
