

55 Enumerators To Take Jackson County Census

Fifty-five enumerators will work in Jackson county during decennial census to be taken in April, it was announced today by Guy Corliss, Medford, assistant district supervisor for the census bureau here. They will be led by three crew leaders, two in Medford and one in Ashland.

A census office will be opened soon in the Medford city hall. Corliss explained, and another crew leader's office will be established in the Ashland city hall.

Job Applications

Applications for the jobs of crew leader and enumerator are now being accepted, and those wishing to apply should write to the census district office, room 205, Armory building, Eugene, Ore.

All jobs will be awarded following a one hour written competitive examination, Corliss said. It is not a civil service exam, but will be for temporary federal employment. Enumerators will be paid on a piece-work basis, at about seven cents per name, Corliss explained. Enumerators should own a car, he said, have a high school education or the equivalent, and be between 21 and 65 years of age. Veterans will receive preference.

Examinations Soon

Examinations for crew leaders will be given in Medford for the Jackson and Josephine county positions in about a week or 10 days, the census official said. Medford will be one of the training centers for crew leaders. All census employees are required to take an oath of secrecy before accepting the jobs, he said, and there are stringent penalties for violation of that oath.

In addition to the population count, there will also be surveys on housing, he added, and in rural areas the bureau of the census will cooperate with the department of agriculture in making agricultural irrigation and drainage surveys.

Well-Baby Clinic Set Next Monday
