

Albert Einstein Should Be Ousted, Rankin Maintains

Washington, Feb. 14—(U.P.)—Rep. John E. Rankin, (D., Miss.) said today that Scientist Albert Einstein has a record of communist-front activity for which he should have been deported years ago.

Rankin put in the house record a report from the un-American activities committee picturing Einstein as having been associated with a number of groups listed as communist fronts.

The committee report was dated today. It was prepared for Rankin, summarizing material on Einstein in the committee's files.

Rankin's blast was prompted by Einstein's statement that the only solution to the present atomic arms race is a "supranational judicial and executive body" to settle security problems.

Rankin attacked Einstein as "one of the greatest fakers the world ever knew."

Alleged Reputation
"Ever since he published his book on relativity, to try to convince the world that light had weight, he has capitalized upon the alleged reputation as a scientist."

"He has been engaged in communist activities in this country for a long time . . . He had no more to do with development of the atomic bomb than if there hadn't been such a thing. American scientists developed the atomic bomb, as General Groves will tell you, and old faker Einstein had nothing to do with it."

Russia Said Only Country Blocking Atomic Control

Washington, Feb. 14—(U.P.)—Assistant Secretary of State John D. Hickerson said today that only Russia is blocking international agreement on control of atomic energy. But he promised that the United States will examine "sympathetically" any new proposals on the problem.

Hickerson said this government is ready to "talk at any time" with Russia about atomic control.

Hickerson called a news conference to deny the latest Russian charge that the United States caused the collapse of atomic talks at the United Nations January 19.

No New Proposal
"The Soviet Union and the Soviet Union alone is blocking agreement," Hickerson said.

Hickerson said Russia's delegate walked out of the UN atomic control talks last month because of a "technical" dispute over whether the Chinese nationalists or communists should be represented.

He said Russia has made no new proposals since it submitted an atomic plan on June 11, 1947. In every United Nations vote since then the Soviet plan has been rejected.
