1949 Phone Company Table Rock Biggest Service Year

"Our year of greatest service to the public" was 1949, J. H. Creager, Medford-Ashland manager of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company, said today.

Citing the annual report of the company received here today, Creager said that \$154,100,000 was put into construction during the year, and brought the postwar total to more than half a billion dollars, "probably a larger investment and a greater addition to the assets of the Pacific west than that of any other company," Creager said.

Since the end of the war, the company has added 1,380,000 telephones to its lines, Creager added, and its fourth million telephones were added in less than three and a half years, compared with 45 years to install the first million, 17 years for the second million, and six years for the third million.

Roman Catholic Church Takes Stand On Bergman Affair

Vatican City, Feb. 15—(U.P.)—Monsignor Dino Staffa, one of the 14 judges of the sacred Rota, said today that the case of Actress Ingrid Bergman and Italian Film Director Roberto Rossellini was that of "two persons living publicly in adultery."

The sacred Rota is the high court of the Roman Catholic church in such cases. The judge's statement was made to the Catholic news agency Ari.

The judge also said the recognition of the civil annulment of Rossellini's marriage by the civil courts in Italy violated the lateran pacts regulating Italian-Vatican relations.

Living in Adultery
"Their situation, even if they contract a new civil marriage, is that of two persons who live publicly in adultery," the agency quoted Monsignor Staffa concerning the Rossellini-Bergman case.

"The notoriety of their persons and of the fact committed only renders greater the scandal created by them and increases their responsibility before God. The sentence with which the court of appeals of Turin has sanctioned the annulment of Rossellini is in contrast with the concordat between the Holy See and the Italian state because article 34 of the concordat itself reserves to the exclusive competence of ecclesiastic tribunals all causes concerning the nullity of matrimonies contracted in the church."
