Your Health and Its Care

DOES THE BABY CRAVE DOPE?

I was horrified recently, writes a mother-in-law, (which is no more or less significant than it would be if she were the mother) when my daughter-in-law visited me with our six-month-old grand daughter, to see her give the baby paregoric one night when the baby was crying. I had always believed it is harmful and should not be given to babies.

However, my daughter-in-law is a registered nurse and she says it was prescribed by her doctor. She used an ounce of it in the few days she was here. Please give your opinion on this.

Ma'am, and the registered nurse and the doctor in this case, and all our readers, that paregoric

is still camphorated tincture of opium.

A hundred years ago doctors employed opium in this form may have been customary. The people were ignorant and the doctors had precious little knowledge of the care and feeding of infants. Besides, babies were a dime a dozen and it didn't matter so much if most of them were killed off in early infancy.

But if your daughter-in-law told the truth—which, frankly, I doubt—I feel as horrified as you do, Ma'am, to find that a reputable doctor (I can't conceive that a registered nurse would employ a doctor without professional standing) prescribes opium in this or other form to quiet babies who are so inconsiderate of the feelings of parents or caretakers as to cry.

Ordinary tincture of opium, commonly known as laudanum, contains just 25 times as much opium as paregoric. That is practically the only difference between laudanum and paregoric so far as the effects of the narcotic are concerned. Thus one-half teaspoonful of paregoric has approximately the same stupefying effect as a drop of laudanum.

Whatever strange notions the doctors and people of earlier times may have had about dopping babies, it is shocking to find that a doctor prescribes such dope for a baby, still more so to find that a mother who has presumably had some education in the care and feeding of infants gives the stuff to her own baby.

It doesn't take more than a few weeks of dopping with paregoric, laudanum or this or that nostrum containing opium, morphine, cocaine or heroin to give the infant or young child a craving for the drug. The craving makes the child cry for more and more. Perhaps the craving accounts for the crying of the baby in this instance.

It would be difficult enough for grandma if the registered nurse were her daughter—everything would then hinge on the intelligence and acrobatics of the on-in-law. It is much more difficult to intercede on the baby's behalf when the baby's mother is a daughter-in-law, regardless of the attitude of the baby's father.

I hope that somehow this good grandmother may manage to rescue the baby from this mal-treatment by the registered nurse before it is too late.

QUESTIONS & ANSWERS

Hair in Appendix
Nine-year-old child with pinworms developed appendicitis. At operation both pinworms and some coarse hairs were found in the appendix. The surgeon could not explain it. (Mrs. O. G.)

Answer—Presence of pinworms in appendix is not rare, most likely they enter the appendix from the bowel where they usually reside in consequence of the inflammation which makes the appendix patulous or open to foreign bodies where normally it does not admit them. Many have the habit of biting or chewing at their hair, and sometimes masses or balls of hair accumulate and cause obstruction of the bowel.

No Medicinal Iodine
I believe I read that you have never advised taking medicinal iodine. (Mrs. C. B.)

Answer—That is best left to the judgment of your physician. I advocate only a minute nutritional quantity of iodine—the quantity every child should get in his or her daily food or water. Send stamped self-addressed envelope and ask in writing for clipping and pamphlet THE IODINE RATION.
