Navy Again Accepting Qualified Enlistees

Due to a large increase in quota, the navy recruiting station in Medford is again accepting applications from qualified men. It was announced today by Chief T. L. Bartholomew, recruiter in charge.

High school graduates making a passing mark on the armed forces qualification test are guaranteed a navy trade school upon the completion of the basic training. If a man desires he may be transferred to either a ship or navy station, where he is given on-the-job training.

Young men who are not high school graduates may also be enlisted in this case, a school is not guaranteed but on-the-job training is given and if the man shows initiative, advancement is regular and he may later be assigned to a school.

New Mexican Held On Larceny Charges Here

Medford police said today that Louis Roy Valdez, 29, of New Mexico, has admitted two thefts from parked cars last summer and is being held on larceny charges in the city hall.

Police said Valdez admitted taking a Zeiss Ikon camera last August from a car owned by Wallace Wang, Chungking inn, and the theft of a sportcoat, fishing reel and tackle box from a car owned by John Robertson, Grand hotel, last June.

Valdez's records show previous sentences in penal institutions in New Mexico and in Colorado.

Gas Dealers Attempt To Avert Price War

The Rogue Valley Gas Dealers' association met here last night for a discussion of gasoline prices in this area and to mobilize their forces in an effort to avert a price war like the one that has spread through parts of California.

Bob Stewart, president of the association, said this morning that prices will be maintained here, so far as possible. "If there is a price war, somebody will get hurt," he said. Some dealers who have cut prices in the Medford area are expected to fall back into line.

The association was formed a year and a half ago and meets regularly for discussions of problems common to all dealers in the valley.
