Part of an old saying which applies to the man who is an eager medicine taker. Individual over-sensitivity to a drug may exist, and usually does, without a person's knowledge. Thus a drug which most people can take without any untoward reaction may be highly poisonous to a certain individual. The person who takes a self-prescribed for the first time is a gambler.

A person may become "sensitized" to a drug by using a few small doses of it. Many persons have become sensitized to the "wonder drugs" by employing them as local applications to the skin and mucous membranes. When these persons develop a dangerous infection in which the wonder drugs would ordinarily suppress, they find themselves allergic to the drugs to the extent that they can not be used. The allergy may present itself as a severe inflammation of the skin, hives, swelling of the mucous membranes and other symptoms.

properly defend the body against infection from without. A microscopic study of a drop of blood will show that these cells are extremely reduced in number when the disease exists. Other features of the disease are ulcerations of the skin, and ulcerations of the lining of the digestive tract. The ulcerative inflammation of the throat which accompanies this disease is spoken of as "angina," and often results in diphtheria. However, not every case develops these complications, particularly if treated early. Untreated cases are highly fatal.

A victim of this disease is "wide open" to any kind of infection. Penicillin, used in treatment, goes far to protect a person against infection while he is fighting the system attacked by the disease. But suppose the victim has been sensitized to penicillin? It couldn't be used. Such a person would be in a sorry state indeed. Other drugs have shown their value in the treatment of this disorder by stimulating the bone-marrow. Blood transfusions are of great value.

It need not be thought that agranulocytosis develops only as the result of taking large doses of these drugs. As a matter of fact a susceptible person may develop the disease following the

Manchester, N. H., Feb. 16 (U.P.)—Top secret sessions were held today by prosecution and defense attorneys preparing for a superior court "mercy murder" trial of Dr. Hermann Sander on Monday.

"We are working on it night and day," County Solicitor William H. Craig said. He refused to make any other pre-trial statements.

Attorney General William P. Phinney, the chief prosecutor, had made an exhaustive study of the trial of John F. Noxon, a wealthy former Pittsfield, Mass., lawyer convicted of the electrocution murder of his six-month-old mongoloid son in 1943.
