

Doctor Nervously Awaits Trial In Mercy Killing As Young Girl Tries To Forget Ordeal Of Similar Case

Manchester, N. H., Feb. 17.—(U.P.)—A 41-year-old doctor waited nervously today in a two-story frame country home for the beginning of his "mercy" murder trial.

In another two-story frame house in Stamford, Conn., a honey-haired girl, half the doctor's age, tries to forget her "mercy killing" trial.

Carol Ann Paight, the girl who killed her cancer-tortured father and was acquitted by a jury of middle-aged parents, knew what Dr. Hermann Nelson Sander was going through.

"I certainly think everybody is praying for him," Carol told the United Press by telephone.

Been Resting

"I know about his case, but I haven't read too much about it—I'm trying not to read the papers," she said. "I've been resting."

Carol said she didn't know enough about the case of Dr. Sander even to wish him good luck. But the slim, tall college senior, and the soft-spoken athletic general practitioner have a common bond. They were paired strangely in trials that have brought the issue of euthanasia—"mercy death"—out of the abstract phrases of the pamphlet, the text book, the legislative hall, and the pulpit and into the quick arena of the courtroom.

Both were the center of world attention. Both have been praised, denounced, defended, attacked. Both have a good reputation among the home folks. Both were charged by their states with taking human life in violation of the laws of God and man.

On the lawn of the white house in Stamford there is a neatly lettered sign: "Carol

Paight"—the name of the father Carol killed. On the rural-type tin mailbox at the side of the doctor's home insuburban Candia is lettered: "H. N. Sander, M.D."

Held in Custody

Carol did not see her home from the time she shot her father until she was acquitted nearly five months later, because murder is not a bailable offense in her state. Dr. Sander, charged with first degree murder, has been free in \$25,000 bail, an action rare in capital cases in his state.

There was a report that when the trial begins in superior court at 10 a.m. Monday, the state will ask that the defendant's bail be discontinued and that he be re-arrested and kept in custody for the duration of the trial. That would be possible, although under the law the bail could be continued until there is a verdict.

Asked about the report, Attorney General William L. Phillips replied "Why should we?" A member of the attorney general's staff said he knew of no plan for such action, but added that "anything is a possibility."

Car In Pond, Ducks Protest; Send Police!

Dow Plant Explosion Kills Eight, Hurts 26

Midland, Mich., Feb. 17.—(U.P.) Dow Chemical company said today that the explosion which ripped through a paint laboratory, killing eight and injuring 26, caused more than \$500,000 damage.

The blast tore off the roof yesterday and wrecked one side of the two-story, block-long brick building which housed the firm's latex plant. Fire broke out and firemen battled three hours.

Authorities said they had no clue to the cause of the explosion.

Gen. Clay Defends Plans To Battle Blockade By Reds

New York—(U.P.)—Gen. Lucius D. Clay, then U. S. military governor, proposed in 1948 that the United States send an armed convoy across the Soviet zone of Germany to Berlin to break the Soviet blockade of the city.

The U. S. government rejected the proposal, according to Clay, because of the risk that it might provoke an armed conflict with Russia.

Clay Confirms Rumor

Clay confirms his oft-rumored blockade-breaking proposal for the first time in "Decision in Germany," his own story of his four years in the Reich, published by Doubleday.

He said he sent the proposal to Washington on July 10, 1948, less than three weeks after the Soviets had clamped a complete land-water blockade on Berlin on the pretext of "technical difficulties."

By then, Clay said, he was convinced that the Soviet government did not want war, but believed that the western allies would yield much rather than risk testing the Russian position.

Suggestions Overruled

Said Clay: "I reported this conviction to our government, suggesting that we advise the Soviet representatives in Germany that under our rights to be in Berlin we proposed on a specific date to move in an armed convoy which would be equipped with the engineering material to overcome the technical difficulties which the Soviet representatives appeared unable to solve."

"I made it clear that I understood fully the risk and its implications and that this was a decision which could be made only by the government."

No Convoy Passes

"No armed convoy could cross the border without the possibility of trouble. In my view, the chances of such a convoy being met by force with subsequent developments of hostilities were small. I was confident that it would get through to Berlin and that the highway blockade would be ended."

"When our government turned down my suggestion, I understood its desire to avoid this risk of armed conflict until the issue had been placed before the United Nations. I shall always believe that the convoy would have reached Berlin."

Montana Civil War Vet Suffers Attack

New York, Feb. 17.—(U.P.)—Civil War Veteran Samuel Bennett, 102, of Miles City, Mont., was hospitalized today after a bus ride from Washington, D.C., to visit a friend.

Bennett, last surviving member of the GAR in Montana, collapsed in Times Square last night just as he was about to hail a cab. He told police he felt week after walking up the steps from the subway.
