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Prior to the passage of these laws, the assembly said, 41 states had statutes covering subversive activity. Generally they dealt with sedition, covering acts or statements which held the state in contempt or incited its people to flaunt its laws.

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In Maryland, the loyalty law enacted by the 1949 legislature met defeat in its first court test. The law required oaths from all public employees and provided fines and imprisonment for membership in subversive organizations.

The court ruled that the law violated the freedoms guaranteed by the first and 14th amendments. **State To Appeal**
However, the state plans to carry the case to the Maryland court of appeals and possibly to the U. S. supreme court.

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Potato Farmers Get Senator's Call Down
Washington, Feb. 18—(U.P.)—Senate Democratic Leader Scott W. Lucas, Ill., today accused potato farmers of abusing the government's price support program in order to boost their profits.

"Potato growers," he said, "have taken every advantage of the rules. Lucas said these farmers should be 'the last individuals in the world' to complain about congressional efforts to trim costs of the multi-million-dollar potato support program."

He issued the statements in reply to a plea from the National Potato council that he delay action on legislation which would remove price supports from potatoes unless they are placed under strict marketing quotas.

Ex-Grants Pass Man Seeking Morse Seat
Upstate political analysts say the competition for the republican nomination for United States senator, in opposition to incumbent Wayne Morse, has been complicated by the filing of Earl L. Dickson, Albany grocer.

Dickson joins Fred Robinson of Medford as an anti-Morse candidate. Walter W. R. May, Oregon City publisher, and George L. Kohen, Portland industrialist still have not decided whether they will seek the junior senator's seat but one Portland observer writes that Robinson and Kohen would withdraw if May elects to run.

Dickson formerly had cash-and-carry grocery stores in Springfield, Salem and Eugene, in addition to the one in Albany. His one-man campaign against the state highway department's limited access roads won him wide publicity.

He was born in Washington 58 years ago and has been a logger, rancher, office equipment salesman and an oil company employee. He is a former Grants Pass resident.

Rescuers Find Body Of Avalanche Victim
Lomita, Cal., Feb. 18—(U.P.)—A rescue crew of 60 men dug through the night and most of the day to recover the smashed body today of Lester L. Newton, 55, buried under an avalanche of sand and he walked through a deep sand pit with two of his workmen.

Buried with Newton, superintendent of a sand and gravel company, were four bundles containing 144 sticks of capped dynamite, but explosives experts said they would not explode unless ignited.

Husband Of Rita Hurt In Skiing Accident
Gstaad, Switzerland, Feb. 18 (U.P.)—Prince Aly Khan, husband of Rita Hayworth, broke his right leg today while skiing on the Wassengrat slope near this Alpine resort hamlet.

The prince screamed in pain as he was being hurried on a stretcher to a hospital. He was skiing down the last stretch of the Wassengrat, accompanied by a ski instructor, Moritz Moratti. The instructor said the prince swerved in trying to dodge another skier, caught the edge of his ski in hard snow, and spilled.

"It was a terrific fall," Moratti said. "The next second I heard him scream. We gave him some pills, but they did not help much."
