Model Airplanes Compete Today On Agate Desert

The first free flight model airplane contest of the year will be held today on Agate desert west of Camp White and south of Bybee bridge by the Medford Prop Nuts, local gas model airplane club, with entrants expected from Klamath Falls, Yreka, Roseburg, Salem and Ashland. Approximately \$140 in prizes have been posted by the club.

Events to be held will be competition in rubber powered engines and gas models, with the latter divided into four classes depending on size of engine.

Hot Competition
Biggest competition is expected in the newly created one-half A class for the real small engines with a displacement of not more than .05 cubic inch.

In this type of contest the tiny planes are sent aloft with no control by the owner and are allowed an engine run of not more than 20 seconds. The object being to get a long glide after the motor quits running. Maximum time allowed in one flight is 10 minutes. A three flight total is used to determine the winner.

Prizes include three K&B torpedos valued at \$15 each and \$125 in merchandise certificates.

Any flyer of model airplanes is invited to attend regardless of residence or club affiliation. The public is cordially invited and there will be no admission charge made.
