The bride of 57 years cut the first slice of a large wedding cake and a granddaughter, Dorothy Jordan, served.

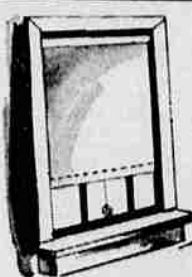

A general business meeting will be held and a nominating committee appointed. There are 18,000,000 lightning storms a year over the earth.



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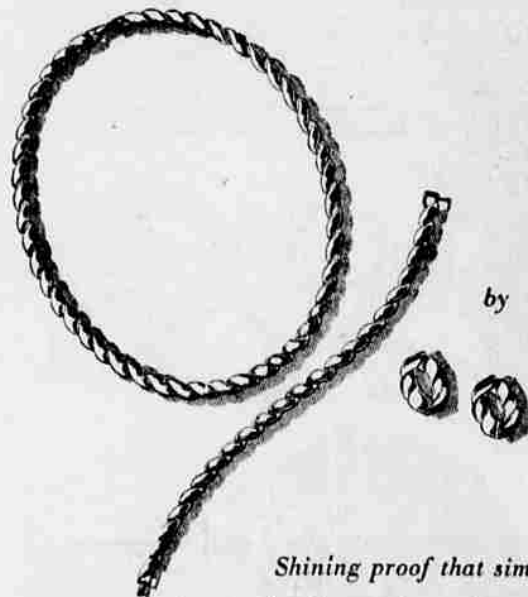
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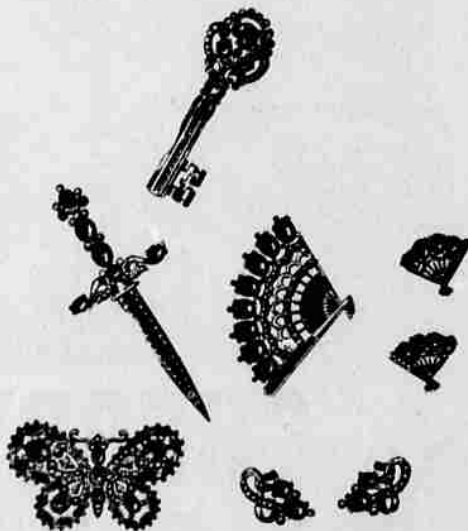
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
