Methods Of Teaching Explained At Meeting Of Washington Group

A film entitled "Broader Concept of Methods of Teaching," presented by Mrs. Dunbar Carpenter, and a demonstration by Miss Mable Nansen of the way music is taught in the Medford school highlighted the meeting of the Washington School Parent-Teacher association on Friday afternoon.

Miss Nansen's talk, entitled "How We Do It in Music," pointed out that no child is "tone deaf," that every child can be taught to sing well, and she illustrated with a group of first grade students the methods used in the music departments of Medford schools. "Special emphasis is placed upon making the teaching of music enjoyable to the child with games," she stated, "and children are never given discouragement in their efforts but rather are encouraged to do better through praise."

In introducing the sound film, Mrs. Carpenter stated that the principles illustrated are applicable to teaching children in the home as well as in the school. The movie is produced by the McGraw-Hill company and is distributed through the audio-visual department of the University of California. It is widely used throughout the country at parent and teacher gatherings and illustrates the difference between the teaching of facts in the formal teacher-dominated classroom style and the method which develops in the child abilities to think for himself, self reliance and the most important concepts of democratic principles in getting along with others.

Celebration of the founding of the parent-teacher organization was observed during the tea hour and Mrs. John Carter, president of the Medford Council of Parents and Teachers, spoke in tribute to the founders, Mrs. Frank Ragsdale, vice-president of the Washington association, presented corsages which had been donated by Girl scouts of Washington school to Mrs. R.
