Speakers Discuss Education Phases At PTA Meeting

The part which the home, the church, the school and the community play in the education of children was discussed at the meeting of Junior High School Parent-Teacher association held last week at the schools. Mrs. A. C. Cameron, vice-president conducted the meeting.

Speaking for the home Mrs. George Connor, mental hygiene chairman for the Oregon Congress of Parents and Teachers, said "the home is the most important center of everyone's life; it can be a liability or an asset to our civilization." Mrs. Connor said she believed there was a "definite swing" to the idea of parents and teachers working together to develop the personality of a child, and reminded her audience that it takes two parents to make a team for the guidance of a child.

The Rev. Jarvis, speaking for the church, declared that the average American community has a rich heritage; that of freedom, of individual initiative and of the Kingdom of God. He said the time was past when the home, the church, the school or the community could point to any one of the others and say "there is the trouble" and there must be a realization that "we are coming into an age in history when no single group of people, by any means, can solve the world problems of today. We are in the most critical period of world history; we must be true to the heritage that is ours."

The Rev. Mr. Jarvis is pastor of the First Christian church. Developing the theme of the school, Mr. Becken, assistant superintendent of schools, declared "We in the school profession have entrusted to us the greatest resource of all—your children. This is the problem we share with the church, community and the home."

Mr. Becken urged his listeners to acquaint themselves with the school, to visit school occasionally and follow the children through classes. "If there is anything wrong with the school program as far as your boy and girl is concerned, let us hear about, do not tell it around in the neighborhood or let it roll around town. The schools are what you make them."

He spoke of increasing enrollment in Medford schools and said "We have to gear with the times." Mrs. Smith, high school teacher and parent, spoke on the community and peace and said since the community is a group of families "it seems to me that the community as a whole to world peace is actually the building of strong families. Mrs. Smith said parents should know their community, should 'get into the swim of things' and give something of themselves, should use the vote wisely, join current groups to inform themselves and further desirable legislation."
