Rossellini Gives Up All Claims To Stromboli Earnings

Rome, Feb. 21—(UPI)—Italian Director Roberto Rossellini said in an interview published today that he has renounced all claims to American earnings of his film "Stromboli," starring Ingrid Bergman.

He said he had decided on the step because RKO's Hollywood studios had mutilated the movie to an extent that "I do not recognize it as my film."

Rossellini said he was a "victim of Hollywood brutality" and charged that RKO promotion for the film "borders on pornography."

The director, father of Miss Bergman's 19-day-old son, made his statements in an interview published in the interview weekly magazine, "Vie Nuove" (New Ways).

Rossellini and his brother, Renzo, who has just returned from America after completing the musical score for "Stromboli," both were quoted as attacking the "low level of culture and intelligence" of Hollywood.

The director was quoted as saying that RKO Chief Howard Hughes personally had promised him that the only changes to be made in "Stromboli" would be those necessary to meet U. S. censorship regulations.

"I think that the boycott effected against my film is due above all to the absolute incomprehension of that which it signifies and of the cinematographic language with which my ideas are expressed," he was quoted.

Grocer Acquired Of Resisting Arrest

Stockton, Cal., Feb. 21—(UPI)—Charles Hawkins, a grocer who thinks fair trade laws are unfair, was acquitted of charges that he resisted arrest when state agents entered his store to charge him with selling a bottle of wine without a liquor license.

The jury was unable to agree, however, whether Hawkins was guilty of selling liquor without a license.

The next move is up to Prosecutor Bradford Crittenden, who will decide today whether he will ask for a retrial or dismissal of the charges.

Hawkins' clerk, Byron Norton, was acquitted of a double charge of resisting arrest and disturbing the peace.

Hawkins was arrested January 10 at his store, which he advertised as the "largest independent store in Stockton." He was accused of selling an agent of the state board of equalization a bottle of wine for 39 cents. The fair trade price was 45 cents.

Rex, who this year is Businessman Reuben H. Brown, and the Queen of Comus, debutant Mary Brooke Soule, traditionally bend their knees to no one. On the other hand, the permanently noble Briton and his American-born wife are accustomed to scraping before few people.

The Rex parade was scheduled for noon. Comus, so select a society that \$2,000 once was offered for two last ball invitations, bursts into full marching and waltzing splendor tonight. By that time, the masks which are legal only from midnight to sundown—and only today—must be off.
