Green's confectionery team of Medford left little doubt in the minds of basketball fans last night that it was the better quintet among Medford area AAU teams as it rallied in the second half to whip the Rogue River town team 68 to 46 at the senior high gym.

Rogue River started like a house afire to run up a 14 to 11 first quarter lead and hold the confectionery quintet on almost even terms in the last quarter. However, the Green's team rapped in 40 points to 15 for the Rogues in the middle quarters to help win.

The game started slowly with neither team showing too much in the way of accuracy but a big fall follow by the name of Huntington for Rogue River displaying good coordination and basket-making ability under the other basket.

Fouled Out Late

Had this fellow not fouled out in the last half the score might well have been closer than it was.

Green's showed again that it can outrun most opponents and it did so in that last half, indicating the players are in good shape and although the storemen lack height, can give an opponent a rough time by just out-running him.

The victorious quintet lacked the services of its high-scoring ace Tex Gatlin but still others came through in the clutch to help the cause. Palmer joined the squad once again to push in 12 points and Busack and Werner each got 11 for high scorers among the locals.

Rogues Take Lead

The score at the first quarter favored Rogue River 14 to 11, at the half Green's was ahead 29 to 22 and at the third quarter pause the confectionery team had gone out in front 51 to 29.

First game of the evening saw Fleischman's Lumber enter the district playoff finals by downing the Grants Pass Legion quintet 44 to 41 after the half time score was tied 19 to 19.

Dodgers Sign Two Pitchers For Big Club

New York, Feb. 22.—(U.P.)—Branch Rickey, the shrewd, bushy-browed boss of the Brooklyn Dodgers, today struck back at charges that he paid "coolie wages," claiming that his team is as high-salaried as any in baseball.

In announcing the signings of Pitchers Preacher Roe, the club's ace left-hander, and Clem Labine, rookie right-hander, Rickey disclosed that his 1950 team will be the highest paid in Brooklyn history and cited two arguments in defense of his salary policies.

No Holdouts Cited

The 37-year-old Rickey said that since he became president of the Dodgers in 1943, the club never had a holdout and never cut a player's salary—until this season.

Rickey admitted, however, that two players were asked to take pay cuts for 1950 and that one of them probably would become the Dodgers' first serious holdout in eight seasons.

He did not identify the players, but the two offered pay slashes were believed to be Catcher Bruce Edwards and Pitcher Rex Barney. And since Edwards came to terms yesterday along with outfielder Carl Furillo, the lone recalcitrant appeared to be Barney.

Pro Cagers Pull Upset

The Denver Nuggets, perennial basement tenants in the National Basketball association's western division, pulled the biggest upset of the pro season last night by dumping the powerful Syracuse Nationals, 89 to 78.

It was only the ninth defeat in 50 games for the Nat, runner-away leaders of the eastern division.

In other games, Chicago whipped Baltimore, 72 to 64; Sheboygan spanked Indianapolis, 83 to 78; Rochester bounced Washington, 84 to 76, and New York turned back Philadelphia, 84 to 73.

Chicago's victory over Baltimore came in the second game of a double header in the windy city in which the Minneapolis Lakers ended the Harlem Globe Trotters' unbeaten streak at 113 games with a 76 to 60 victory.

State Athletic Group Election Held In Medford

At the Medford state athletic commission meeting Dr. W. G. Bishop was elected chairman, succeeding George W. Porter. L. C. Taylor was elected vice chairman and J. F. Fliegel was appointed secretary.

The commission voted to grant to Mack Lillard an exclusive franchise to conduct professional boxing and wrestling in Jackson county for 1950.

The commission voted to transfer to the civic emergency fund \$450. The commission called to the attention of the people of Jackson county that the commission was created by state law and is appointed by the mayor, with the approval of the city council, and that its jurisdiction is all of Jackson county, excepting only such cities as have a commission of their own.

Its jurisdiction is specifically limited to professional boxing and professional wrestling.

State law specifically exempts any boxing tournament given under the sanction or auspices of the Amateur Athletic Union of the United States, or any of its auxiliary organizations, in which only registered members of said union or organizations participate.
