Mercy Death Hearing May Provide Science With Important Revelations

Manchester, N. H., Feb. 23—(U.P.)—Dr. Hermann N. Sander's trial may be the setting for important scientific revelations.

From the evidence, medical science for the first time may learn just what is a lethal dose of air into the veins of a human being. Laboratory scientists have used air injections to kill animals. But the "experiments" never before have been carried on for human trial.

the first time in the history of American courts that a man has gone on trial for murder for using an air injection as the "weapon" for murder.

The testimony at this trial may give science some research information that no scientist would dare attempt to learn through human experiment.

Medical literature does not give the answer to the question of how much air injected into a person's veins will cause death. In this trial it will not be a report on theory. The evidence, whether for the defense or the prosecution, will be based on what is believed to be fact.

Suffering From Cancer
Yesterday the jury was taken to the hospital where Dr. Sander's patient, Mrs. Abbie Borroto, died. She was suffering from cancer of the large bowel that had spread to the liver. The life of such patients often can be prolonged through surgery. Just what sort of treatments Mrs. Borroto received has not been made clear.

The case history of Mrs. Borroto's illness, her treatment, and her death may bring out scientific information that has never been known before.
