Radio McNary Dam Will Offer Features For Vacationists

Wallula, Wash., Feb. 23.—(U.P.)—McNary dam's development by 1933 will offer many features for vacationists and sightseers, the corps of engineers said today.

Col. William Whipple of the Wallula district said today that the McNary dam will be built on a site that will offer many features for vacationists and sightseers, the corps of engineers said today.

The middle Columbia river is flanked by basalt cliffs, near barren lands and some scrub oak. But Col. Whipple said irrigation could permit the growth of shade trees on potential resort sites.

At McNary dam proper the visitor will be able to view power house operations behind soundproof glass, stand in a darkened room with a view of fish swimming up the bypass ladder and survey the spectacle of the dam and its spillways from vantage points on the Oregon and Washington shores.

The powerhouse and fish ladder will be on the Oregon side, and the navigation lock across the river. On the Washington shore a visitors' balcony will accommodate sightseers.

The big pool of water backed by McNary will be reached by various access roads built to vantage points.

The mouth of the Wallula river is expected to provide a good, small boat anchorage. Picnic areas will be provided at the dam site and at other places along the shoreline.

THE HABIT OF TAKING SALTS

Frankly even I can conjure up no cogent reason why you should not take an occasional dose of salts if you like, although I'll be happier if you never offer me a dose of castor oil, salts, mashed potato or—oh, well, how morbid can we get?

Aside from the fatuous notion that a periodic "cleaning out" helps any one, young or old, to keep well, the most popular reason for taking salts is probably plethoria. Old time doctors who bled patients as enthusiastically as some doctors today give "shots," harbored the notion that many maladies were due to too much blood, too rich blood, or too thick blood.

Later, when phlebotomy or bleeding began to fall into disrepute, the doctors turned to the use of salts for the same purposes, that is, to "thin the blood," and today, long after doctors have abandoned this notion, a good many Wiseacres and misguided invalids still dose themselves with strong saline cathartics in the belief that salts "thin the blood" or "lower the blood pressure."

Even if there is no great harm done by an occasional dose of Epsom, Glauber's, Rochelle or other salts—say a whopping dose at the time of the big spring thaw—there can be no doubt that the frequent, regular or habitual use of salts impairs the health and vitality.

This not just my notion. According to Bastard's *Materials Medica, Pharmacology & Therapeutics*, an authoritative textbook, there is "danger in the repeated administration of magnesium, at least to children or those with fractured bones or bad teeth." Magnesia is magnesium hydroxide, commonly known as milk of magnesia. Magnesium sulfate is commonly known as Epsom salts. Magnesium in any form is physiological antagonistic to calcium and so excessive intake of magnesium tends to force calcium from the system—from the nerves, the bones, the teeth. Goodness knows most of

us suffer from calcium deficiency anyway.

The popular habit of indulging in frequent doses of magnesium sulfate (Epsom salts) or milk of magnesia (magnesium hydroxide) or the antacid powders (magnesium carbonate and light or heavy magnesium oxide) accounts for a good deal of the adult tetany which is rarely diagnosed because physicians harbor an obsession that tetany is a disease of infancy. Mind, this applies only to frequent doses of magnesium, not to an occasional dose.

The ill effects of excessive intake of magnesium are more marked when the individual's diet is poor in calcium to begin with. Moreover the manifestation of the ill effects may be modified or moderated by supplementing the ordinary everyday diet with calcium and vitamin D.

Tetany, whether in infant or adult, is a nutritional deficiency state, sometimes distressing or alarming in an infant, but rarely if ever fatal. It should not be confused with tetanus (lockjaw), an acute infectious disease caused by the toxin produced by growth and multiplication of tetanus germs (Clostridium tetani) in the depths of a wound, puncture, powder or fireworks burn or bite or scratch by a domestic or wild animal or bird, and is likely to prove fatal if tetanus antitoxin is not administered as part of the first aid treatment of such wounds or injuries. Both terms, tetany and tetanus, are derived from a Greek word meaning spasm.

Well, then, some readers may ask, if Epsom salts, effervescent solution of magnesium citrate or milk of magnesia is not the laxative, cathartic or purgative, just what do I suggest for a thorough . . .

Nothing at all. Don't try to kid me. This is the twentieth century.
