

Redskins vs. Westport, 8:15 Tonight in Basketball Game

Ashland, Mar. 2 — Brookings will meet Oakland, Ore., at 7 p.m. and Jacksonville is slated to take on Westport at 8:15 p.m. today in second round games of the Southern Oregon college invitational basketball tournament.

Jacksonville entered the second round last night by easily defeating Phoenix high 44 to 25 and Westport edged St. Mary's high of Medford 40 to 37.

This afternoon Butte Falls was scheduled to play Gold Hill at 3:30 and Talent was billed to take on Lorane at 2:15. The Talent vs. Lorane game was a third round contest while the late afternoon fray was a second round tilt.

Butte Falls entered the second round by downing Bandon 52 to 37 and Gold Hill got that far by edging Elkton 32 to 31. Talent stopped Creswell 55 to 24 and Lorane edged Valse 34 to 32.

Prospect entered the consolation round by losing to Oakland 40 to 24 and Brookings edged Paisley 49 to 29. Coos River was eliminated from further tournament competition by losing its second game, this time to Riddle 31 to 22.

St. Mary's was scheduled to play Phoenix at 1 p.m. today in the first round of the consolation.

Losers of tonight's games will play at 3:15 p.m. Friday and those losing this afternoon's games will vie at 2 p.m. Friday. Winners of the games are scheduled to compete at 7 p.m. tomorrow for the night contests.

Losers of today's consolation round games will vie at 9 a.m. Friday in the upper bracket and at 10:15 for the lower bracket.

The championship game is billed for Saturday at 8:15 p.m. with second place to be decided starting at 7 p.m. Fourth spot game will start at 3 p.m. and the consolation title at 2 p.m.

Corvallis, Mar. 2 — Oregon State basketball team will travel to Seattle this week-end for its final pair of games against slumping University of Washington.

The Beavers, now carrying an 8-6 mark, are two full games behind leading Washington State and would have to sweep the Seattle series while the Cougars were dropping their last two to Idaho to finish in a tie for the loop title.

Oregon State can do no worse than tie for second and one win over Washington would give Slats Gill's men undisputed possession of runner-up spot.

Washington and Oregon State broke even in their initial meeting this season at Corvallis with the Beavers winning the first night, 56-46 and the Huskies coming back strong for a 52-44 decision.

Kahut Fights On March 14
Portland, Ore., Mar. 2—(U.P.)—Promoter Tex Salkeld announced today that Bill Petersen, Chicago, and Joe Kahut, Portland and Woodburn, Ore., have been signed for a fight billed as the Pacific northwest heavyweight championship at the Portland auditorium March 14.

Petersen is the defending titleholder. Salkeld said he had agreed to terms for a 15-round bout after the Portland Boxing commission last week demanded that he defend or relinquish the crown.

Petersen won the title in May, 1948, when he defeated Kahut in a 15-round split decision.

Big Crowd Seen For Tag Team Skirmish

A partner on the outside may not assist his cohort who is in the ring. That rule, too, is expected to be in for a working-over under the Atlas-Ross version.

The tag team match became possible last week, when the vain Atlas, irked over LaBelle's assistance as a second for Dusette, telephoned Ross to secure him as a partner and then challenged the two Frenchmen. Dusette and LaBelle fell over themselves to accept the challenge and Dusette, who held the unbeaten Atlas to a draw last week, said there will be no doubt as to the outcome tonight.

The opener, over the same route, will send Lee Grable against Karl Gray, starting at 8:30 p.m. Grable was to test his injured leg out last night and if the appendage responded satisfactorily, he would grapple here. No word was received late this morning and it was presumed he would be ready for action.

Medford will play "give and take" with the Oregon state college basketball team this season, according to a news release from Corvallis received today.

The "give" will be Don Fawcett, ex-Medford high athlete, who as a sophomore will be battling for a job at second base for the Beavers' nine this year.

Frank Roelandt, present Tornado basketball coach, is the "take" as he was battling champion for the northern division OSC team last year and ace catcher.

Fawcett has played considerable semi-pro baseball as well as school experience. He played for the Medford Craters and for one of the Central Point teams in the Southern Oregon league.

Keith Wade One Of Top Scorers

Captain Keith Wade of Southern Oregon college basketball team placed third in average points per game and fifth in total points for 12 games played in Far Western conference this past season, official statistics from conference statisticians announced today.

Wade scored 60 field goals and 34 free throws for a total of 174 points in 12 games or an average of 14.5 per game. Best average was 15.8 points by Bob Marsh of Humboldt and second best was 15.1 by Vere Butler of Chico.

Bill O'Neal of SOC had 120 points in 12 games for a 10-point average to place ninth and John Barger of the Raiders scored 103 in 12 games for an 8.6 average to be 11th.

While the Raiders' margin never was more than 10 points and seldom did it go over 5 points, there never seemed much doubt as to who would be the victor.

It was a rough affair from the start with a total of 59 fouls being called. 33 on Oregon college of Education and 26 on SOC Three Raiders left in the last half due to five personal fouls and four were banished from the OCE team for the same reason.

Capt. Keith Wade of the SOC quintet once again paced the point-making as he poured in 17 points.

SOC led at the halftime pause 31 to 25, and with about 6 1/2 minutes to play the Ashland club was on top by 57 to 48.

Salmon and Steelhead Tags Dated

Portland, Ore., Mar. 2—(U.P.)—Salmon and steelhead tag cards will be issued to Oregon anglers after March 6, the Oregon state game commission announced today.

The tags were to have gone into effect today, but a delay in shipment of the tags forced postponement of enforcement of the new regulation until next Monday.

Tags Given Free
The tags, which will be given free to all anglers, will be available at commission license agencies or at county courthouses.

The cards will contain a number of detachable tags. When a salmon or steelhead more than 20 inches in length is caught, a tag must be torn from the card and attached to the fish. The date and name of the stream where fish is taken must be written on the card in the space provided.

The cards will be retained by anglers until May 31, 1951, when they should be returned to the commission for study of the catch.
