

# Redskins Win Fourth, Prospect Loses Consolation Round Title

Ashland, March 4—Jacksonville high won fourth place and Elkton took consolation round top honors in games played Saturday afternoon in the Southern Oregon college invitational basketball tournament here.

Prospect was the loser in the clash with Elkton with the Loggers dropping a 42 to 30 decision after the final victors led 18 to 10 at the half.

### J'ville Wins 39-27

Jacksonville slapped down Butte Falls 30 to 29 in one of the closest games of the entire tournament to win fourth spot in the championship round. The score was tied 14 to 14 at the halftime whistle pause.

Talent high entered the semifinals Friday night by edging Gold Hill 34 to 28 and later in the evening Friday Westport came from behind in the second half to nip Oakland 35 to 28. Talent led its game at the half 17 to 14 and Oakland was ahead 16 to 14.

Butte Falls high entered the playoffs for fourth place in the tourney by eliminating Lorane 54 to 32 Friday afternoon and Jacksonville reached the same playoff by walloping Brookings 53 to 19.

### Prospect Winner, 39-27

Other games Friday saw Elkton enter the consolation round championship finals by edging Valsetz 33 to 28 and Prospect get the same spot by taking over St. Mary's (Medford), 39 to 27. Gold Hill, as loser of Friday night's first game, was slated to play Oakland for second place Saturday night.

### Darrell Johnson To Get Welter Title Chance Wednesday

Owen Thomas and Larry Burdette, matchmakers for the Southern Oregon Boxing club, yesterday announced a double main event which will headline their next offering at the armory on Wednesday, March 8.

The feature bout will see Kenny Carothers, outstanding Grants Pass leather pusher, against Darrell Johnson, Medford. They will scrap for the southern Oregon welterweight championship which Ray Stichel was forced to vacate when he moved to Santa Rosa, Cal.

Both are unbeaten in their amateur career, Carothers having won 12 straight by knockouts and Johnson undefeated in matches here and in the northern part of the state.

Odom vs. Wolfe  
The other half of the dual offering will send Dale Odom, Medford carpenter and candidate

for middleweight honors, against Donovan Wolfe, Phoenix, conqueror of Don Harper on the last card.

The promoters have also arranged an outstanding supporting card with some of the bouts rivaling the double main event for interest.

Harper, who was unbeaten until he tangled with Wolfe two weeks ago, will attempt to get back in the win column when he takes on Russ Williams, Grants Pass. Williams lost a disputed decision to Wolfe here last December and the Williams-Harper encounter is expected to turn into a killer-diller semi-windup.

Dick Adkins, a strong candidate for lightweight honors which also have been vacated by Stichel, goes against Chief Super, fast Fort Jones Indian. Super is a good boxer and figures to give Adkins the acid test. They tangled about six months ago in Fort Jones with Adkins coming off with a hair-line verdict.

Vernon To Fight  
Hugo Vernon, Medford, makes his initial ring debut by taking on the veteran Eddie Conrad, another Fort Jones Indian. Conrad has had a number of amateur fights but if Vernon lives up to advance raves, he should take Conrad.

A rematch, which has been signed by popular demand, including requests by both fighters, will pit Corky King, knock-out winner over Bill Berry, against Johnny Hamilton, Butte Falls. Hamilton won a split decision in their get-together of two weeks ago.

Another match, to raise the curtain at 8:30 p.m., is yet in the making, the promoters said.
