Defining electricity as a form of energy, the speakers gave a discussion of the electrical terms, ampere, volts, watts and kilowatt, and talked on the operation of circuits, fuses and meters.

Portland, Ore., Mar. 7—(U.P.)—A measure to raise \$1,000,000 annually by raising water rates will be tested before the city council again, Mayor Dorothy McCullough Lee and Commissioner Ormond R. Bean said today.
