Five Negroes Killed In Pendleton Crash

Pendleton, Ore., Mar. 7.—(U.P.) State police said today that five Negroes were killed in a flaming automobile when it crashed head-on into a truck on the highway six miles west of Pendleton. The dead were identified as Robert Knox, 45; Mr. and Mrs. Alphonso Knox; Mary Louise Mouton, 22; and Nell Todd, 24. Officers said their car collided head-on with a United Trucklines vehicle driven by Elgie Farris, Boise, Ida. Farris was uninjured. Police said the car carrying the Negroes apparently was attempting to pass another truck when it swerved into the path of Farris' vehicle. Knox was hurled from the car and died instantly while the others were trapped in the car which caught fire.

Josslin Not To Be Governor Candidate

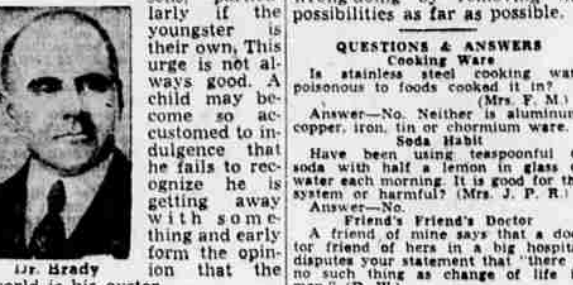

SOMEBODY HAS TO BE THE BOSS
The urge to shield and protect a child against all trials and upsets is pretty strong in most persons, particularly if the youngster is their own. This urge is not always good. A child may become so accustomed to indulgence that he fails to recognize he is getting away with something and early form the opinion that the world is his oyster.

A child may throw a toy to the floor and receive a sweet smile and a caress from his mother for his cute action. When he tosses a bottle of nail polish all over mama's new dress he's apt to get the bejeepers knocked out of him—which situation he can't understand—and I must confess I can't either. Many children are exposed to a constant "NO, NO!" type of rearing, which does little else than confuse them. If a child is allowed to "get away" with an action in the presence of the "no-no" treatment, he learns to regard the no-no as being of very little importance. A child should not be permitted to do anything the no-no is directed against. He should learn early that NO is a thing which is final and unquestionable. The parent should never use the term as a warning—rather he should use it as an irrevocable ultimatum.

Parents who spank their children are invariably those of the no-no school. If the child's actions are not too troublesome, they will usually settle for a string of no-no's. The no-no's meaning little or nothing to the child, he is very apt to go on to bigger and more interesting adventures, and earn a spanking for his efforts. Here the spanking serves as an outlet for the parent's frustration and anger but serves only to humiliate, frighten, pain and confuse the child who is not aware of transgressing his rightful domain.

Other than to startle or frighten a child, the word, NO, uttered in a loud, shrill and angry tone, means little more than the same word in an ordinary conversational tone. The child who receives an excess of attention and love is then badgered by a ceaseless string of no-no's, followed by a spanking, is destined to have trouble. His trouble is not of his own making—it's of his parent's making.

A mother states that her (only) child is unmanageable and that she is at her wit's end. Spanking does no good, she laments. The child does the same thing again, immediately. What to do? A parent who strikes a child is wrong. If the child does wrong, he does so because he has not been rightly trained by the parent. Here, of course, I am speaking of a succession of wrongs. Every child has a moral right to do things wrong occasionally. A child should be taught by example and not by punishment or fear. Most of the spankings which occur would never happen if a "cooling-off" period were enforced. Most spankings are vicious outlets for parental anger. They degrade the parent and insult the child, who actually is a small edition of the adult, with all the feelings, pride and love of life the parent has.

How many parents who spank their children have ever read an authoritative book on child psychology or child rearing? These can be had for little or nothing. Achievement of parenthood does not automatically qualify the parents as an authority—on anything. The parent who spans a child displays his ignorance and reveals his vicious character. He always makes himself out as helpless and holds up the child as an incorrigible. If parents received whippings in the same proportion to their misdeeds their children do—the (the parents) would spend a lot of their time in a hospital. Children should be praised when right and ignored when wrong.

AWOL Soldier Lands In Clink After Use Of Big Persuader

Hayward, Cal., Mar. 7.—(U.P.) A "mighty persuasive" .38 revolver sent Donald R. Hainey, 28, an AWOL soldier from Fort Worden, Wash., to jail today. Hainey, armed with his "persuader," first held up a San Francisco night club and took \$210. Then he flagged a taxi-cab, ordered its driver, William E. Clark, San Francisco, to take him to Berkeley and, as an afterthought, robbed the cabbie of \$5. Hainey liked Clark's company so he made the cab driver accompany him while he took \$150 from another bar in Berkeley. Then he had Clark chauffeur him to Oakland, where, in an expansive mood, he gave the cab driver back his \$5, plus a tip. Clark notified police who picked up the soldier as the bus went through Hayward.

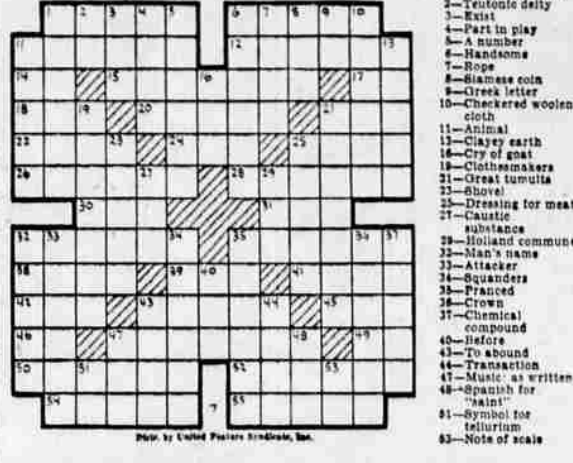

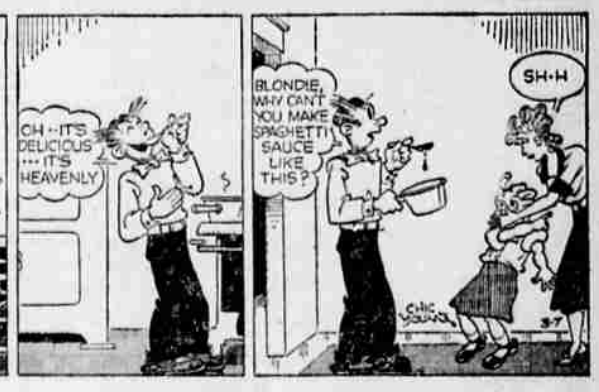
