

Japanese Midwife Has System To Easily Determine Sex Of Unborn

Tokyo, Mar. 8—(U.P.)—Every body in Japan knows that one thing, and one only, determines the sex of a child, Anako-San, a plump, successful Tokyo midwife, insisted today.

She brushed aside the idea of predicting the sex of an unborn infant by the look in its mother's left eye, or by the reaction of rabbits or rats to certain tests.

Just Nonsense

"Nonsense, all nonsense," the licensed midwife said in a tone of voice allowing no argument.

"The sex of the child is determined by the first visitor to enter the home after the child is conceived."

"If it's a male visitor, the baby will be a boy. If it's a woman a girl."

"unless she wants to have a rotten child."

Can Eat Sea Food

On general principles, Anako-San said, pregnant women should not eat the meat of four-legged animals. Sea food is all right but not clams before birth and not crabs afterward.

"If an expectant mother eats a clam, the child will stick out his tongue," she explained. "A crab eaten after birth will turn into worms in your stomach."

Asked if her first-visitor theory had proved 100 per cent accurate, Anako-San did not hesitate. It had, she said.

"But what happens if the first visitor is a man and the child is a girl?"

"Obviously," she said, "the man was not the first visitor."

Dr. Arthur Taylor, Southern Oregon college will teach Oregon History (History 377) for two hours credit with the first session scheduled Monday, March 27 from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m. The class will convene in Room 22 of the senior high school. This subject is required for Oregon teacher certification. Tuition is \$7.
