

Grade School Basketball Tonight, Saturday at CP

Central Point, Mar. 10—Three games, two of them in the B championship semi-finals, will be played tonight in the annual Jackson county grade school basketball tournament at the Central Point high gymnasium.

First game, a quarter-final in the consolation round of class A, will send St. Mary's (Medford) against Gold Hill at 6 p. m. with the winner playing at 5 p. m. Saturday for the class A consolation title.

C. P. Seconds Slated

At 7 p. m. today Central Point second team will play Lone Pine and at 8 p. m. Shady Cove is slated to meet the Central Point third quintet with both games in the class B championship semi-finals. Winners for these two games will play for the title at 7 p. m. Saturday.

This afternoon at 4 o'clock Jacksonville was scheduled to play Phoenix and at 5 o'clock Rogue River second team was billed to meet Sams Valley, both in the consolation semi-finals.

Saturday's Contests

Saturday at 8 p. m. Central Point first team and Rogue River first quintet will play for the class A championship and at 7 p. m. the winner of the Shady Cove vs. C. P. third team will meet the victor of the C. P. second vs. Lone Pine for the B championship.

Howard school will play the Rogue River seconds vs. Sams Valley game victor at 6 p. m. Saturday for the consolation class B title and at 5 p. m. tomorrow will be the class A consolation title contest.

'Dons' Underdog In NIB Tourney At N.Y. Saturday

New York, Mar. 10—(U.P.)—Defending champion San Francisco, just as much an underdog as last year, is ready and able to repeat its 1949 triumph in the National Invitation basketball tournament, Coach Pete Newell said today.

"The boys have the same driving spirit as last year," said the young coach of the Dons. "They sure don't feel like 12 to 1 shots, and neither do I."

Twelve to one is the price the "wise boys" have placed on the Dons to win the big post-season classic that starts tomorrow afternoon at Madison Square Garden.

CCNF Favorite Also

The same boys also have named City College of New York a 2½ point favorite to stop Newell's gang in the first round.

"We were just as much an underdog last year," Newell pointed out, "and you remember what happened then."

Basketball followers never will forget the stirring march of the '49 Dons through a series of upsets to the N. I. T. title in a final round victory over Loyola of Chicago, nor the performances of little Playmaker Rene Herreras, five foot nine inch whiz, or six-six Don Logan, voted the tourney's outstanding player.

Favor UCLA Cage Champ

Los Angeles, Mar. 10—(U.P.)—Never a Pacific Coast conference champ but frequently a southern division winner, the UCLA Bruins were five point favorites today over Washington State for the PCC basketball title.

The two teams meet tonight in the opening contest of a best two-out-of-three series for the conference championship. They will play again tomorrow night and then Monday night if a third game is necessary.

The PCC titlist also will win the right to represent the far west in the NCAA basketball tournament.

West Amateurs Battle Chicago Ring Tonight

Chicago, March 10—(U.P.)—The top 32 amateur fighters in the west will battle tonight in the semi-finals and finals of the 23rd annual Chicago Tribune Golden Gloves tournament.

Winners of the eight championships will scrap the New York Golden Glove winners in the Chicago stadium March 29.
