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'Hour of Sharing' Services Today Nation's Churches

New York, Mar. 11 — The world's dispossessed and homeless millions will be remembered when 24 million Protestant and Eastern Orthodox Christians go to church.

In "One Great Hour of Sharing," they will offer prayers for their suffering brothers and share their money with the needy people of the world.

In most of the 100,000 participating churches, ministers will preach sermons on the theme, "Bear ye one another's burdens and so fulfill the law of Christ."

Sponsored by the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America, the Foreign Missions Conference of North America, the United Council of Church Women and the U.S.A. Member Churches of the World Council of Churches, the project is coordinated by Church World Service.

Twenty cooperating denominations, hundreds of local councils of churches, community churches, youth groups and others have for the past three months mobilized their local groups for the drive.

Funds collected will be used for relief, reconstruction and interchurch aid projects in Europe, Asia, and the Near East, through individual denominations and through cooperative groups.

Indications Of County's Growth Shown In Report

Indications of Jackson county's growth during the past 10 years, outstripping neighboring counties, were revealed recently in figures released by the secretary of state's office showing comparative motor vehicle registrations.

The figures listed are as of December 31 of 1940, 1947 and 1949. For those three dates this county's vehicle registrations totaled 15,089, then 22,543 seven years later, and last December 28,185.

Klamath county, which surpassed Jackson county in registrations in 1940, with 17,100 vehicles, has been left far behind since then. In 1947 the county to the east had 17,912 registrations, only slightly more than seven years before, and in the last month of 1949 they had 21,693.

Josephine county figures for the same three periods were 6,361, 10,367 and 12,919.

Indications Of County's Growth Shown In Report

The meaning and methods of soil conservation and how it can be applied in Jackson county will be the subject of two meetings scheduled for this week in the Central Point and Eagle Point Grange halls.

A referendum on the proposed district has been set for March 22 in which landowners holding more than 10 acres of land may vote. The district would include all of the county except the area around the city of Rogue River.

Walter and Tracy Andregg and Mrs. Bertie Daniels, officers of the association, all of Portland, will be present and all persons interested are invited.

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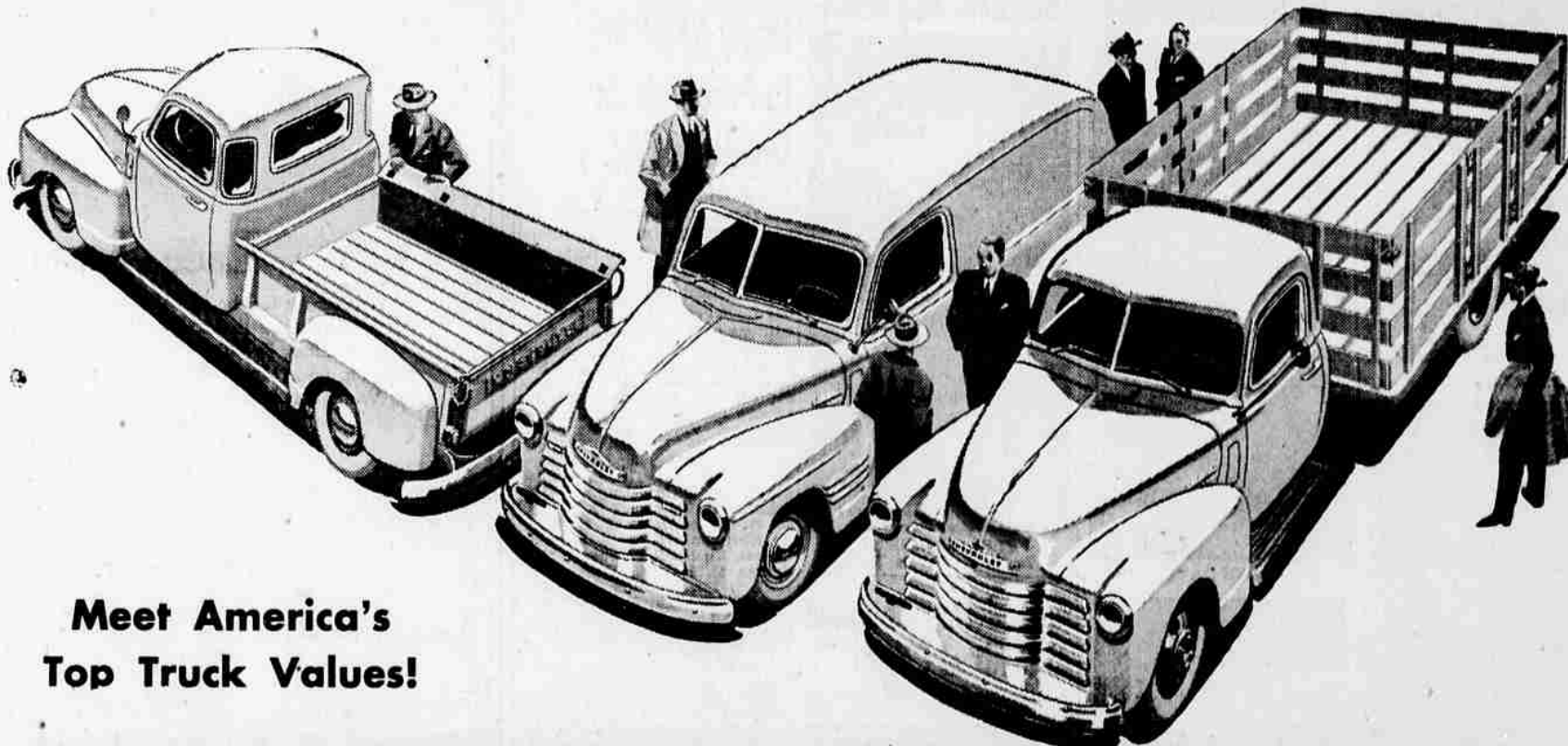
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
