The film will be shown one day in Ashland at a date to be announced later, Corbin said.

The film will be shown at the Esquire theater, and special matinee performances will be arranged for school students, according to Corbin. He said he hopes to make arrangements whereby students buying specially-priced matinee tickets may be excused from school.

The picture will be shown at advanced prices because of re-quirements of the producers, Corbin said. "Hamlet" was produced and directed by Sir Laurence Olivier, who also plays the title role in the Shakespearean play. The picture has won critical acclaim and awards for excellence in most of the nations of Europe and North America.

Hollywood, Mar. 15 (U.P.)— Producer Sid Rogell opened a "campaign button drive" today to cheer up the Hollywood crepe-hangers who're worried about the box-office slump.

He's passing out little white buttons for movie-moguls and theater exhibitors to stick in their lapels. They read: "I am a booster."

That's all. But they're supposed to make people ask about 'em. And that's where Rogell's "sun- shine theory" comes in. "It's psychology," he said. "A little gimmick that's swung

thousands of political campaigns—the lowly lapel button. The minute anybody asks what they are for our industry leaders can launch into some good sales talk about movies. It'll cheer people up."

Including, Rogell hopes, the movie moguls. He's a little peeved at all the negative talk that's floating around Hollywood these days.

Sponsor Sunshine
"I guess we'll have to re-sell motion pictures to everybody," he said. "Including the boys at the top. They all ought to get to- gether and sponsor a little sun- shine and good will."

Movie bosses may handle mil- lions every day, Rogell added, but they can out-moan anybody when it comes to howling the blues.

"Only a fool would have ex- pected the box-office income to stay at the record peak of the war years," he said. "And yet, when it started to get back to normal again, the Hollywood mourners were already starting to hold a wake and lower the body of movies into the grave."

This, said Rogell, is downright dangerous.

Can Be Passed On
"This kind of talk can be pass- ed on and on and on until it has everyone in the dumps includ- ing the customers. And then business will get bad."

Later on, Rogell wants every- body to wear one of his little white buttons.

"I'll sell 'em for \$1," he said, "to everybody in the industry; ushers, studio chiefs, projection- ists, actors, directors, truckdriv-
