Noted Art Teacher Coming For Association Workshop

Prof. Emmy Zweybruck, internationally noted teacher and artist, has been secured by the Southern Oregon Art Teachers' association for a workshop to be held in Phoenix March 24 and 25.

Professor Zweybruck is director of the New York studio of the American Crayon company and founder of the University of Arts and Crafts of Vienna. In addition she designs for Saks Fifth Avenue, Macy's, Lord and Taylor and other New York establishments.

The artist is known to art teachers of southern Oregon, having conducted a successful summer school in design and crafts in Klamath Falls in 1949. It is stated that Professor Zweybruck brings to workshops a warm, human approach to art education and a confidence that inspires high endeavor.

Of particular interest to the teachers will be her exhibit of modern art as found in everyday life. Professor Zweybruck is expected to show art work done on wrapping paper, packages and advertising art, with designs based on modern principles of rhythm, color harmony and laws of modern design. She is said to believe that through these media the modern spirit and modern approach to design can be brought to the attention of thousands.

Attendance at the Friday session of the workshop is by invitation only, it is stated, and these are to be extended through school superintendents, supervisors or principals of the schools of the area. All members of the Southern Oregon Art Teachers' association are invited, provided arrangements are made through the school office. It is stated, "Attendance Saturday is for all teachers interested in art education."

Materials for use during the two-day session may be purchased at the workshop, and the cost per person will not be over \$5.50, those in charge state. Lunch has been arranged by the Phoenix school, and there will be a small charge.

Hours for the workshop are as follows: Friday, March 24, 10 to 5 p.m.; Saturday, March 25, 9 to 12 a.m., 1 to 6 p.m.
