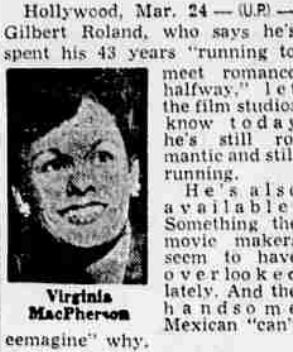

Threatened Coast Bus Strike Said Settled

San Francisco, Mar. 24 (U.P.) — A threatened strike of Pacific Greyhound drivers in seven western states was avoided here today by a settlement reached between the company and the AFL Motor Coach Employees' union.

Federal Conciliator Omar Hoskins said the settlement, reached after three successive days of negotiation, involved wage claims, disciplinary action and the interpretation of the contract.

A disagreement as to arbitration procedure caused the union to initiate a strike vote, but the settlement has now eliminated the need for any arbitration, Hoskins said.
