SHOTS AND PILLS—A PLACE FOR EACH

The advantages of injecting a drug are many. When a drug is injected, the doctor knows the whole dose is used. If a patient takes a drug by mouth, he may decide that the dose is "too strong" and take instead, what he thinks is right. Upon injection, the drug is immediately utilized.

Occasionally, in the presence of a peptic ulcer or other digestive disturbance, drugs taken by mouth may produce nausea or other distress. When the drug is injected, this possibility is avoided.

Some drugs are not effective when taken by mouth. Insulin is an example of this. Other drugs, however, this does not imply that the patient should take the drug without the supervision of the doctor.

As to the question as to why some doctors employ injections only and never prescribe medication by mouth—1 pass. Let your own doctor answer that question. He may have good reason for it.

Generally speaking, if a drug is effective when taken by mouth and does not cause any undesirable side effect, there would seem to be very scant need for injecting it. Iron, for example, is usually well tolerated when taken in appropriate form and dose by mouth.

Certain hormones are destroyed by the digestive process and are totally ineffective by mouth. Other hormones are highly effective when taken by mouth. Liver extract is used for injection because the equivalent in terms of the original product would impose upon the patient the difficult task of consuming great quantities of a very unpalatable material.

Liver extract is used for certain specific disorders—pernicious anemia being the chief indication. Iron is of very little use in this disease. Simple or nutritional anemia responds to iron taken by mouth.

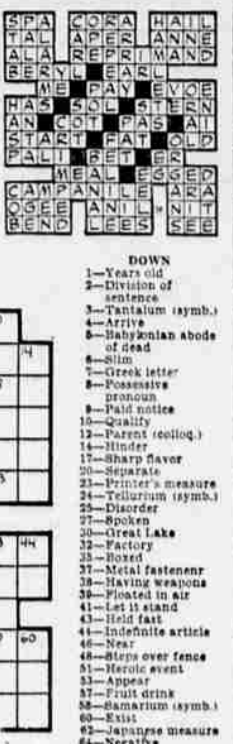
