Camp White Hobby Show Scheduled Sunday Morning

The first hobby fair to be held at the veterans administration center at Camp White will begin at 10 a. m. Sunday, with more than 40 veteran members of the center entering displays of their hobbies and handiwork.

The fair is being sponsored by 33 volunteer service organizations, and will be open to the public. Flowers and decorations will be furnished by garden clubs of the valley. Entertainment will be presented by Eve Prentice and her 50-piece accordion band.

The hobby show will be conducted by the arts and crafts division of the special services department at the center. Examples cited: Collections and specimens of craftsman's work will be Indian arrowheads, handwoven baskets, a collection of local landscapes in water colors, photography, free-hand drawings, woodwork, including model ships, wooden dishes and other items; rag rugs made by blind members; a variety of gem stones, gathered, cut and polished here; leatherwork, copperwork, stamp collections, short stories, articles and editorials, textile work and many others.

A prize will be awarded for the most unique exhibit, with other prizes for the best exhibit in each of several categories, and ribbons for other winning entries.

Judges will be experts in the various fields from valley communities. The public has been invited, and center officials are expecting a large turnout.

Bureau Plans To Continue Study Of Surplus Water

Washington, Mar. 31—(U.P.)—The reclamation bureau is going forward with its \$500,000 attempt to find out whether Columbia river surplus water can be taken to the arid southwest. Reclamation Commissioner Michael W. Straus advised Rep. Walter Norblad, (R., Ore.), that his bureau was aware of the many problems posed by the question.

"We know the cost would be great," Straus said, "but we believe that the benefits which would be realized would be immeasurably greater."

In reply to Norblad's letter objecting to the half-million-dollar investigations, Straus gave him this promise:

"If our continuing studies reveal that... there will not be any surplus water in the Columbia river under ultimate conditions, I can assure you that we will not recommend further investigations or construction."

But Straus added that bureau engineers now estimate the river would carry 150 million acre-feet of surplus water if all 238 projects listed in the latest Columbia basin report were built. Allowing for an extra basin use of 20 million acre-feet, he said, the surplus flow would be 130 million acre feet.

"Such an allowance," he continued, "would provide for a growth in domestic, industrial and agricultural demand within

Traffic Deaths Mount During February

Chicago, Mar. 31—(U.P.)—Mild weather caused a nine per cent increase in February traffic deaths, the National Safety council said today.

The council counted 2,190 fatalities last month, an increase of nine per cent over February, 1949, the biggest percentage increase for any month since August, 1946.

Council President Ned H. Dearborn said that the unseasonable weather permitted more travel than last year, especially in the mountain states, and that more travel usually means more accidents.

The February toll brought the 1950 fatalities to 4,650, six per cent more than the same period last year.

The increase, Dearborn said, was general with all parts of the nation except the west coast reporting average increases from five to 33 per cent.

Perfect records for the two months were reported by 254 cities, including Tacoma, Wash., and Kansas City, Kan.
