BEER AND THE LIVER

Alcohol is the chief cause of cirrhosis of the liver. So said the great Dr. Osier in the "doctor's bible" fifty years ago. No one has ever been able to produce cirrhosis of the liver in animals by the administration of alcohol, although the attempt has been made repeatedly. So says Dr. Frank B. Mallory, professor of pathology, Harvard, in the Cylopedia of Medicine and Surgery.

Osier hedged a bit, however, by adding that cirrhosis is more common in countries where strong spirits—whiskey, gin and brandy—are used than in those where wine and malt liquors—ale, porter, lager, stout, beer—are the popular alcoholic drinks.

When I was a medical student some of the cases of cirrhosis of the liver selected by our instructors for group study were in heavy beer drinkers, and in one instance the professor of medicine presented in his clinic a patient with cirrhosis who had for years consumed three pints of beer a day and never more and never any other alcoholic beverage or liquor.

These views of an earlier period were not necessarily correct. As Haggard & Jellinek state, in their book Alcohol Explored (Doubleday Doran, '42): "Among the bodily diseases of chronic alcoholism, cirrhosis of the liver looms in the public mind as the most characteristic; in spite of the fact that the disease does not occur in more than 8 per cent of all chronic alcoholics, that it occurs in individuals who use no alcohol, and that there has been medical controversy over the question of whether it is any way related to alcohol."

Among 210 cases of cirrhosis of the liver in France excessive consumption of wine (vin ordinaire) alone was noted in 68. Combined autopsy records of many large hospitals showed that cirrhosis of the liver was found nearly nine times as often in chronic alcoholics as in moderate or temperate drinkers and abstainers.

One of the authorities cited above (Howard W. Haggard, M.D., director of the laboratory of applied physiology, Yale University) said in a personal communication that among chronic alcoholics it is rare indeed to find one who limits his drinking to beer. It is the high concentration of alcohol in the distilled spirits that gives the excessive drinker the "kick" he seeks and the polyneuropathy he eventually suffers. (Polyneuropathy means multiple neuritis, beriberi, general paresis or partial paralysis.)

Then Dr. Haggard, whose scientific study of the alcohol problem is supplemented by extensive clinical experience in the treatment of alcoholism, observed:

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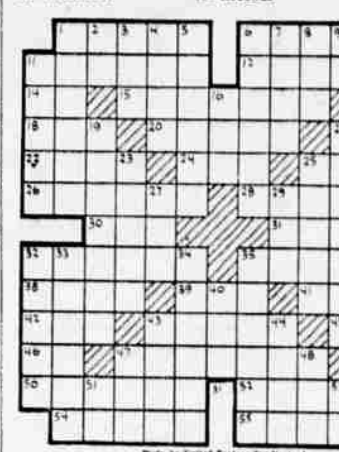
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CROSSWORD PUZZLE
