

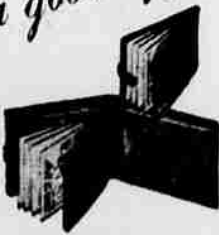

### Red Cross Instructs Eleven Gray Ladies; New Service Started

Inspired by the needs of community service, members of the Jackson County Red Cross have launched the new program known as "Service to the Community." Eleven gray ladies have completed a training course which was conducted here during the week for those interested in the course.

Women who completed the course are Mrs. Arthur C. Sanders, Mrs. J. E. Gribble, Mrs. Edward G. Burgess, Mrs. John S. Day, Mrs. Chester Guch, Mrs. Dale Newton, Mrs. L. B. Thomas, Mrs. R. M. Bartels, Mrs. Max Pierce, Mrs. I. E. Schuler and Mrs. Shelby Tuttle.

Mrs. Melvin Krows, Miss Vera Humphrey and Miss Margaret Nason also took advantage of the informative program.

This is entirely an innovation for gray ladies since it will have been the only community where such a service has been instituted by Red Cross services.

Heretofore gray ladies have been trained only for service by the staffs of military hospitals.

Instruction given in the three-day session included such subjects as "activating a community service," social attitudes, public welfare, health services both in community and at home and medical, psychological, personal and spiritual aspects.

Dr. A. Erin Merkel, county health officer, presented a program on child guidance, rehabilitation and needs of an educational program in health work. Mrs. Blanche Frisbie, county health nurse, gave in detail the technique of home servicing.

"Medical Aspects of Lay Visiting" was presented by Dr. Richard Sleeter, in which he stressed understanding and the importance of the right kind of program.

Mrs. Vera Thompson from Oregon Commission for Blind impressed members of the class with her subject, "Psychological Aspects of Visiting the Blind." She urged education in use of the "white cane" and requested the blind be spoken of only as visually handicapped. Mrs. Thompson stated that there were over 60 such handicapped persons in Jackson county.

The Rev. George R. Bolster spoke to the gray ladies as "those doing Christian work who go out and seek and do not wait for it to come to their door."

Since this is a new branch of Red Cross service in which there is a great deal of interest, it is being observed closely by area office of the Red Cross in San Francisco. Miss Mildred Samuelson, assistant director of that office, stated she was confident this group would develop a pattern which possibly could be followed by other chapters.

This group will work in full cooperation with local doctors, Jackson County Public Health association, the welfare office and Medford Ministerial association.
