Anjous and Bartlett's Due for Bud Spray

Pink bud spray should now be applied to anjous and bartlett's for scab control since the flower buds are now well separated in the cluster. County Agent C. B. Cordy said today. The spray should be applied to other varieties as the buds separate, he said.

He advised the use of two gallons of liquid lime sulphur or six pounds of dry lime sulphur per 100 gallons for bartlett's and bosco. For other varieties, he said orchardists should use one and a half pounds of ferbam per 100 gallons.

For green fruit worms which are now hatching, orchardists should add one half pound of 50 per cent DDT to the mixture.

Remind Pear Growers Of Marketing Meeting

Frank A. Rowe, manager of the Jackson county production and marketing administration committee, today reminded pear growers of a public hearing to be held Monday at 9 a.m. in the Journal building in Portland to consider proposed amendments to the marketing agreement and order regulating the handling of winter pears grown in Oregon, Washington and California.

The proposed amendments would authorize separate regulations for export shipments, and permit the establishment of minimum standards of quality. Varieties of pears affected are beurre d'anjou, beurre bosco, winter nelsis, doyenne du comice, beurre aster and beurre clareau.

The hearing in Portland, Rowe said, is the first of three to consider the proposed amendments. The second will be in Yakima, Wash., the 13th, and the third in Sacramento April 17.
