**Baski Picked Bout Tonight**

New York, Apr. 7.—(U.P.)—Lum- bering Joe Baski and Young Bernie Reynolds, a pair of al- ways-hopeful heavyweights, col- lided tonight in a 10-round bout at St. Nicholas arena that could be the most important bout either ever has fought.

Baski, the six-foot, one-inch 215-pound former coal miner from Kulpmont, Pa., was a 2 to 1 choice.

That weight—about 25 pounds more than Reynolds packs—plus experience and a crushing right hand punch, were seen as Baski's main weapons.

The 28-year-old slugger will have to fire everything tonight, for he may be "washed up" if he loses. On the other hand, a decisive victory could catapult Baski into the high ranks.

A similar victory, of course, would do the same for Reynolds.

**Northwestern, Michigan Gain Basketball Coach**

Chicago, Apr. 7.—(U.P.)—Only one Big Ten basketball team, Purdue, remained coachless to- day as Northwestern and Michi- gan State announced new men- tors for the 1950-51 season.

Michigan State reached into the Big Seven to hire Wilbur Stalcup of Missouri, a veteran of 15 years tutoring college cagers, while Northwestern named Har- old G. Olsen, 24 year veteran of the Big Ten, at Ohio State.

**Salem High School Restraint Denied**

Salem, Ore., Apr. 7.—(U.P.)—The Oregon supreme court has denied an application for a re- straining order which would enable 18 salem high school students to continue in classes.

The 18 were suspended by the Salem school board last fall for belonging to a society it called secret. They received a tempo- rary restraining order which kept them in classes, while they appealed to the courts on grounds that their group was not secret.

Circuit Judge Dal M. King of Coos county, who heard the case here, upheld the school board last month and dissolved the em- porary injunction. Testimony at the trial was that the group, which the boys called the Amer- ican Boys club, was affiliated with a Portland group known as Alpha Beta Chi.

**Oregon Indian Tribes Given Compensation**

Washington, Apr. 7.—(U.P.)—The United States court of claims today awarded three Oregon In- dian tribes \$377,447.50 as com- pensation for lands taken by the government in 1855.

The tribes are the confederat- ed bands of the Umpqua, the Calapooias residing in the Ump- qua and the No-Lal-La-Las. The two tribes in the Umpqua valley received \$342,450.74, while the No-Lal-La-Las got \$34,996.85.

The tribes were three of 17 tribes and bands which sued the government for money and in- terest they claimed was due them from federal seizure of their lands.

**SHOT BY PLAYMATE**

Superior, Wis., Apr. 7.—(U.P.)—A 12-year-old boy was treated for a .22 caliber gunshot wound in his lung today after he was shot by a 13-year-old playmate for refusing to leave the older boy's home.

Shoshone Falls, on Snake river in Idaho, is 46 feet higher than Niagara Falls.

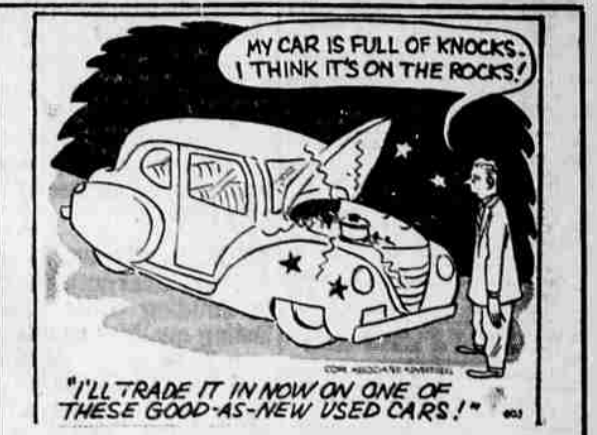
**New Phone System Now In Use at City Hall**
