HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE AND THE ADRENAL GLANDS

The adrenal glands are small bodies situated at the top of each kidney—one to each kidney.

These glands are part of the endocrine or ductless gland system. The glands are composed of two well-defined sections from each of which different chemical substances are delivered to the body.

Of these substances the one best known to the public is adrenalin. The actions of this powerful chemical have been the source of innumerable articles for lay consumption. Suffice to say here that adrenalin slows the heart rate, raises the blood pressure and increases the output of sugar in the urine.

In the complicated system of checks and balances, stimulation and inhibition under which bodily functions proceed according to demand and changing circumstances, it is, at this time, not entirely clear as to just what the entire system of opposing factors to adrenalin embraces.

In normal functioning of the body, adrenalin is delivered to the various tissues according to their needs. In disease of the adrenals—tuberculosis for instance—the glands may be unable to manufacture sufficient secretion to meet the needs. Addison's disease—in which bronze-like pigmentation of the skin develops accompanied by weakness, low blood pressure and eventual death, is a classic example of the possibilities.

When a tumor of the adrenal is surgically removed—(there is no other way of handling it) the blood pressure immediately falls—even before the operation is completed. It is occasionally necessary to even inject adrenalin during the operation to maintain blood pressure at a safe level.

Until recently, the diagnosis of adrenal tumor involved considerable difficulty. A small tumor which does not displace adjoining structures is very difficult to demonstrate in this location by x-ray. A new drug is now available which instantly combats or "neutralizes" adrenalin in the body. When this drug is injected into the blood stream, an immediate fall of blood pressure results if the increased pressure is due to an excess of adrenalin. If the hypertension is due to some other factor, the blood pressure remains as it was.

Again, I would call your attention to the fact that "high blood pressure" is not a disease. There is no such thing as a "normal" blood pressure. There is such a thing as average blood pressure for certain groups of people in given environments. "L. O." blood pressure is also not a disease. Variations in blood pressure occur in the presence of various disease states. The blood pressure "figures" indicate little or nothing to a patient as they do not represent improvement or worsening in a disease which does not, in fact, exist.

QUESTIONS & ANSWERS
Your doctor is most competent. This may sound terrible to you, but I have seen a doctor and take—and (a barbiturate and another sedative) each night, on a doctor's prescription. Variations in blood pressure occur in the presence of various disease states. The blood pressure "figures" indicate little or nothing to a patient as they do not represent improvement or worsening in a disease which does not, in fact, exist.

Thanks so much for your assurance that it is safe for anyone to use such things as walla, slippers, key cases and desk pads, made by patients in a tuberculosis sanatorium. I spent three years "curing" in the san, where the amount of unhappiness caused by frightened friends and relatives was appalling. (W. N.)

Answer—As a matter of fact friends or casual visitors are safer while in the sanatorium than they are while engaged in everyday work, business, social activities, etc. have learned how to prevent infection, where the people on the outside know little and care little about it. Objects made or handled by patients in a tuberculosis sanatorium are as safe for anyone to receive and use as money, letters, checks, books, papers, magazines, etc. (M. H.)
