Seattle, Wash.—U.P.—University of Washington scientists are testing a popcorn-like substance for possible use in making light, cheap concrete. Dr. Peter D. Johnson and Dr. James I. 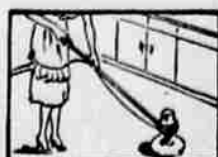
